Senator MCKENZIE asked:

- 1751. For the financial year 2011-2012, how many kilowatt hour of electricity did the department/agency consume?
 - a. What was the total cost?
 - b. What does this cost work out to per employee?
- 1752. What increases in electricity costs has the Department/ agency experienced since the introduction of the carbon tax?
 - a. How has this changed the Department/ agency's spending pattern?
 - b. What programs or services have been cut to meet the increased costs?
- 1753. What measures is the Department/ agency taking to reduce its electricity expenditure?
 - a. When did these commence?
 - b. What impact have they had?

Answer:

- 1751. 4,533,473 Kwh
 - a. \$1,073,925.22
 - b. \$295.77
- 1752. Nil increase in electricity costs.
 - a. No spending pattern changes.
 - b. Nil program cuts.
- 1753. The ABS has sought to minimise its electricity cost by;
 - Implementing green IT initiatives like Wake-on-LAN to allow software updates whilst automatically shutting down computers across the ABS saving energy;
 - Installing motion sensors in all ABS House tenanted areas and energy efficient LED within certain areas of ABS House to reduce energy consumption;
 - Procuring 10% green energy as part of the whole of government energy contract for ABS House and 10% green energy for the Victorian office;

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- Programming shorter automatic shutdown periods on most ABS printers together with duplex printing as default;
- Implementation of a knowledge framework, incorporating digital recordkeeping rather than paper records and automatic recordkeeping facilities for ABS workgroup databases; and
- Utilising computer assisted interviewing to replace paper forms.
- a. The above initiatives commenced in 2010.
- b. Reduced electricity costs and environmental footprint.
