Question

Childcare in rural and regional areas of Australia

Senator BACK: Could focus now with me on rural and regional areas of Australia? I understand from that data that 13 per cent of women are finding themselves in the position of either being unavailable for work or unable to work more hours because there are not places available. It may have referred to non-metropolitan areas or areas outside large regional centres. Can you assist there? And can you take on notice and provide me with information—perhaps on a state by state basis—on whether your comment of there being adequate positions overall is also accurate for rural and regional areas in different states please? Ms Taylor: We will certainly take that on notice. We can look at our vacancy data by state and where those vacancies are. I take your point, and I will take that on notice. Senator BACK: Thank you.

Answer

The Child Care Vacancies Quarterly Snapshot – June Quarter 2011, released on 20 January 2012, shows that across Australia 88% of reporting long day care services had vacancies during the reference week of 5 June 2011. Of the 61,620 long day care vacancies each day, 17,800 were in regional and remote Australia.

The State and Territory breakdown by regional and remote Australia is as follows:
