Question

Comparison of number of industrial disputes with other countries

Senator ABETZ: So we are agreed. How do we sit in comparison with other countries with whom we might be competing on world markets?

Answer

Data is very limited for international comparison on industrial disputes because the data collection methods vary considerably between countries.

Australia's rate of working days lost from industrial disputes is relatively moderate when compared to countries with whom Australia competes on world markets.

Latest available comparisons show that in 2011, Australia had fewer working days lost per thousand employees (23.9) than the United Kingdom (53.0) and significantly less than Canada (92.3). However, Australia had more working days lost per thousand employees than New Zealand (2.2) and Germany (1.9) in 2011.

Recent and comparable data are not available for the United States of America, France, and Japan.




Figure 1: Annual WDL from industrial disputes, Australia and other countries
