Senator Cash (L&CA Hansard page. 42) asked:

Provide a breakdown of the US\$56.34 million in project funding to the IOM and the A\$882 550 core and administered funding.

Answer.

The A\$882 550 is the subscription fee paid in one instalment to IOM through the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC), and as such there is no further breakdown.

The following is a breakdown of the DIAC funded projects, totalling USD43,899,185, delivered through IOM for the 2011 calendar year. All amounts are in US dollars.

The remaining USD12,441,639 in projects were funded through AusAID and the Australian Customs and Border Protection Service who should be contacted for details.
