Although I made a submission to the Senate Committee Enquiry on the *Food Standards Amendment (Truth in Labelling – Palm Oil) Bill 2011*, I would like to summarise as follows:

1) The destruction of rainforest in Southeast Asia and elsewhere threatens to cause widespread extinctions of fauna and flora.

2) Overwhelmingly the main cause of rainforest destruction is its replacement by oil palm plantations.

3) Chief among the species threatened are the two species of orangutan, which are, after chimpanzees (including bonobos) and gorillas, our closest living relatives.

4) Other mammal species threatened by the critically endangered Sumatran rhinoceros (surviving, precariously, on both Sumatra and Borneo) and Sumatran tiger.

5) Rainforest destruction pours greenhouse gases into the atmosphere, intensifying global warming.6) Awareness and concern about the role of palm oil in contributing to rainforest destruction is slowly spreading in the community.

7) Concerned members of the general public need information on which products contain palm oil so that they can avoid purchasing them.
