Questions on notice, Major General Paul Stevens AO (Retd) – Monday 19 June 2006

1. Is it true that the task of maintaining Commonwealth graves in Namibia is being contacted out to a private company, Kriegsgraber Fursorge Namibia?

The CWGC are and will remain responsible for the care and maintenance of all CWGC graves and co-located German graves from WWI. As has been the custom some of the physical maintenance tasks are contracted out such as:

a. the maintenance of the cross of sacrifice site in Windhoek and the contractor is a Mr J Knoetze a local resident.

b. The Namibian branch of the German organisation Kriegsgraberfursorge receives a yearly financial contribution from the South African Agency (the CWGC office in South Africa) to support the efforts in maintaining the German graves from WWT.

c. From time to time local contractors are appointed to carry out needed maintenance and repairs.

2. Do you know whether this company is going to continue to have the responsibility for maintaining Commonwealth graves?

The above arrangements will continue.

3. What is the status of Namibia - as this treaty was in operation until 1990, presumably - as South-West Africa was a territory of South Africa?

When Namibia was under South African control the South African Agency carried out the work under the authority and protection of the Instrument of Agency.

After Namibian independence and prior to the MOU the work continued to be carried out although no formal agreements existed. During this time there was no contact with the Namibian officials but there was also no interference from them.

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
