Subject:	Ratify the Kyoto Protocol

The Chair,

I a year 12 student currently completing my VCE and despite my preoccupations with study and exams, I am taking the time to demand that the upcoming Parliamentary Inquiry in the Kyoto Protocol ignores the interference of climate skeptics such as the 'Lavoisier Group' or the demands of fossil fuel companies to increase greenhouse emissions.

As a young Australian, I was disgusted at the Government's stance on greenhouse emissions at the Kyoto Conference. While many countries aimed to lower emissions, Australia demanded an increase which will increase the effects the of global warming. This is a decision from which my generation will come to bear the huge implications of in our lifetime, such as increased risk of respiratory illness, cancers, loss of biodiversity, the melting of glaciers and polar icecaps which in turn raise sea levels all irreversible impacts. Obviously our Prime Minister was not too concerned about things that will occur beyond him.

There are plenty of alternative energy sources that Australia should begin the process of adapting to in order to reduce emissions.
