Finance and Public Administration Legislation Committee

The committee met on Monday, 26 May 2014 from 9.03 am to 10.45 pm.

The committee called the:

- the trial of new security measures in Parliament House
- staffing issues in Hansard
- the commissioning of official portraits
- the Queen's crockery set and the gift of crockery purchased by Senators Madigan and Xenophon
- the consequences of the abolition of the COAG Reform Council Secretariat, including office leases, staffing, reporting arrangements, reports produced and the appointment of the Chair
- in relation to the office of the Governor-General, farewell functions for the former Governor-General, refurbishment work at the Governor-General's residence, the first Executive Council meeting and the Order of Australia Council
- procurement procedures for the Australian flag
- in relation to ANAO, the impact of efficiency dividends on staff and services, the process for appointment of the Head of the Commission of Audit, and the Building Better Regional Cities Program
