Standing Order 222A

- (a) A House Appropriations and Administration Committee shall be appointed to:
 - (i) consider estimates of the funding required for the operation of the Department of the House of Representatives each year:
 - (ii) provide to the Speaker for presentation to the House and transmission to the Minister for Finance and Deregulation, the committee's estimates of amounts for inclusion in appropriation and supply bills for the Department of the House of Representatives;
 - (iii) consider proposals for changes to the administration of the Department of the House of Representatives or variations to services provided by the Department;
 - (iv) consider and report to the Speaker on any other matters of finance or services as may be referred to it by the Speaker;
 - (v) consider and report to the House on any other matters of finance or services as may be referred to it by the House;
 - (vi) consider and report to the Speaker on matters relating to the provision of facilities in Parliament House affecting the House, its committees or its Members;
 - (vii) make an annual report to the House on its operations;
 - (viii) consider the administration and funding of security measures affecting the House and advise the Speaker and the House as appropriate; and
 - (ix) consider any proposals for works in the parliamentary precincts that are subject to parliamentary approval and report to the House on them as appropriate.
- (b) When conferring with the Senate Standing Committee on Appropriations and Staffing, the House Appropriations and Administration Committee may:
 - (i) consider estimates of the funding required for the operation of the Department of Parliamentary Services each year; and

- (ii) provide to the Speaker for presentation to the House and transmission to the Minister for Finance and Deregulation, estimates of amounts for inclusion in appropriation and supply bills for the Department of Parliamentary Services.
- (c) The committee shall consist of nine members: the Speaker as Chair, four government Members and four non-government/non-aligned Members. A quorum shall be three members of the committee.
- (d) The committee shall be assisted by the Clerk, Serjeant-at-Arms, and officers of the Department of the House of Representatives appropriate to any matters under consideration.

Annual Report 2022–23

1.1 This report is made pursuant to Standing Order 222A(a)(vii), which requires the House of Representatives Appropriations and Administration Committee to make an annual report to the House on its operations. This report covers the period from 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023.

Reports Presented

- 1.2 In 2022-23, the Committee presented three reports:
 - Report No. 24, Annual Report 2021–2022
 - Report No. 25, October Budget Estimates 2022–2023
 - Report No. 26, Budget Estimates 2023–2024.

Meetings

- 1.3 During the reporting period the Committee met on six occasions.
- 1.4 Key matters considered included:
 - funding arrangements for the Department of the House of Representatives, including estimates of the funding required by the department
 - reviews of compliance with the Electronic Access Control System (EACS) and Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) Codes of Practice
 - regular reporting against the EACS and CCTV Codes of Practice
 - audio-visual infrastructure in the House of Representatives chambers
 - emergency management matters within Parliament House

- security measures at Parliament House
- matters relating to Members' remuneration services provided by the Department of the House of Representatives.

Electronic Access Control System (EACS) Code of Practice

- 1.5 The EACS provides electronic swipe access to suites, including all Members' and Senators' suites, and to other areas in the building. The EACS is managed by the Department of Parliamentary Services (DPS). Of particular concern for both Houses has been the controls put in place to manage the EACS and allow access to the entry logs generated by the system.
- 1.6 The EACS Code of Practice, finalised in June 2020, provides a framework that governs the creation, storage, use and access, release, and destruction of EACS data and takes into consideration potential triggers of parliamentary privilege.
- 1.7 Under the Code of Practice, the Standing Committee on Appropriations and Administration receives quarterly reports detailing all requests for access to and release of EACS data. The Committee notes that the majority of requests for access were by Members, Senators or entities confirming who had electronic access to suites within their areas of control.
- 1.8 Following briefings by DPS and the Committee's consideration of the quarterly access reports, the Committee is satisfied that the EACS Code of Practice has been implemented and that its provisions are being complied with by DPS.

Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) Code of Practice

- 1.9 The CCTV system at Parliament House is also managed by DPS. Access to and release of CCTV data is governed by the CCTV Code of Practice.
- 1.10 Pursuant to clause 15.6 of the CCTV Code of Practice, the Committee considered quarterly reports detailing the nature of requests for viewing and release of CCTV footage and of any breaches of the Code.

1.11 The Committee reviewed each quarterly report during the reporting period, and considered the report of the review of compliance with the CCTV Code of Practice. On balance, the Committee was satisfied that DPS is administering the CCTV system in compliance with the Code.

Independent Review of CCTV Code of Practice

- 1.12 The CCTV Code of Practice requires that the Code be reviewed at least every two years.
- 1.13 In October 2021, the Committee of the 46th Parliament was informed that DPS had commissioned Synergy to conduct the review, with former Clerk of the House, Mr David Elder, to be engaged as an adviser to the review.
- 1.14 The review covered the operation of the Code of Practice from 2019 to 2021, and was provided to the Committee in November 2022.
- 1.15 The review concluded that the Department of Parliamentary Services had complied with key requirements of the Code, and that no issues of non-compliance had been identified.

Conclusion

1.16 The Committee continues to meet regularly to discuss matters relevant to the operation of Parliament House. This includes the provision of services to Members, particularly by the Department of the House of Representatives and DPS. The committee of the 47th Parliament looks forward to building on the work of its predecessors.
