THE PARLIAMENTARY CALENDAR

Parliament

A Parliament commences upon the first sitting day following a general election and concludes either at dissolution or at the expiry of three years from the first meeting of the House—whichever occurs first.

Session

A session commences upon the first sitting day following a general election or prorogation and concludes either by prorogation (the formal ending of a session), dissolution or at the expiry of three years from the first meeting of the House.

Sitting period

Sitting periods occur within a session. Sittings of the House in each calendar year are usually divided into distinct periods—the Autumn, Winter (or Budget) and Spring sittings.

Sitting

A sitting commences pursuant to the standing or sessional orders, or in accordance with a resolution of the House at a previous sitting, and concludes with the adjournment of the same sitting. The same sitting may extend over more than one day.

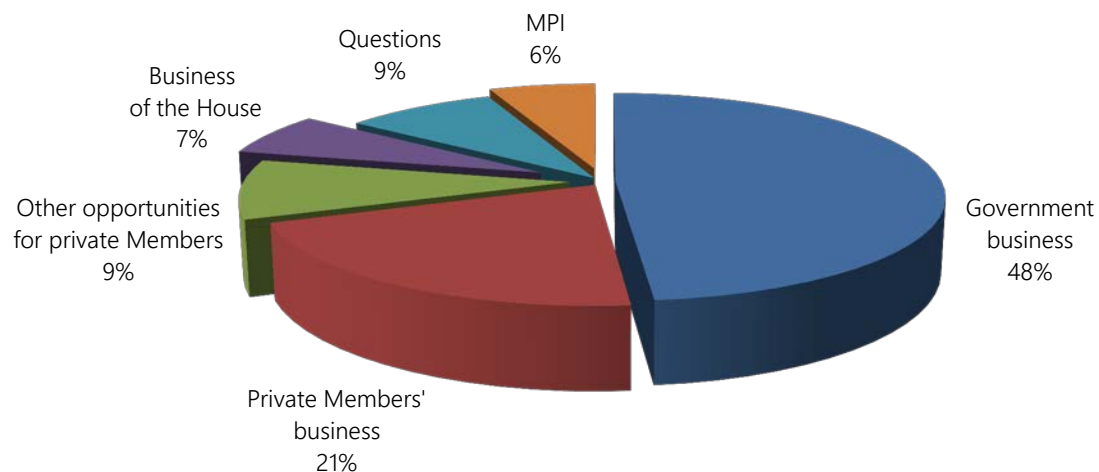

Includes time spent in the Federation Chamber.

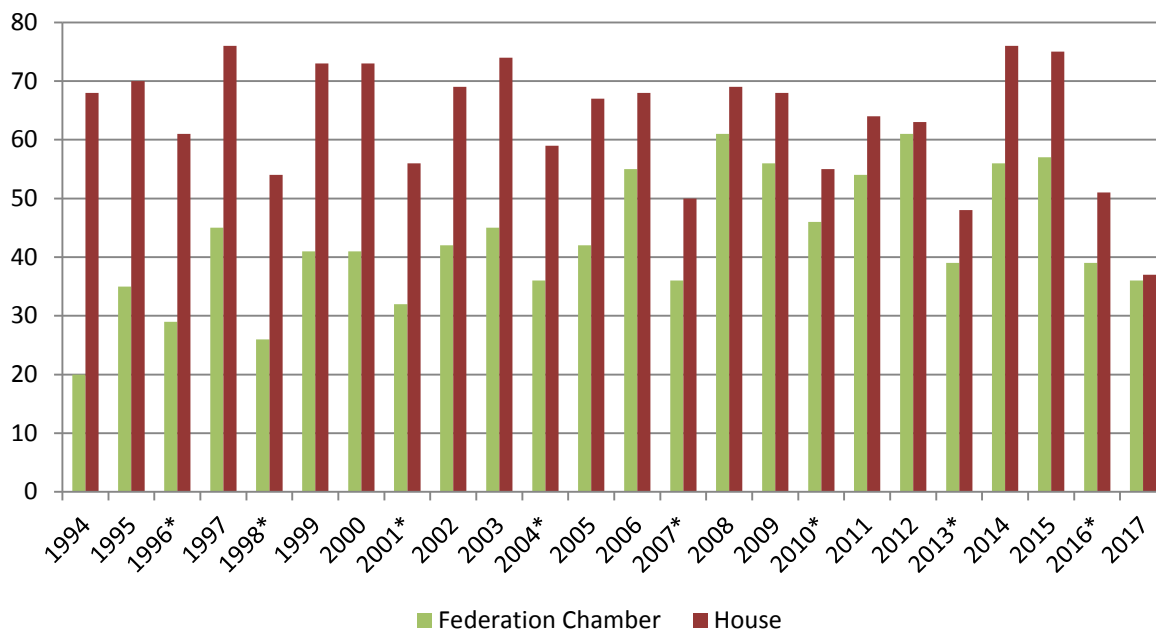
Government business – includes government sponsored legislation and motions (including motions to suspend standing orders) and ministerial statements.

Private Members' business – includes legislation and motions (including motions to suspend standing orders) sponsored by private Members and statements by Members.

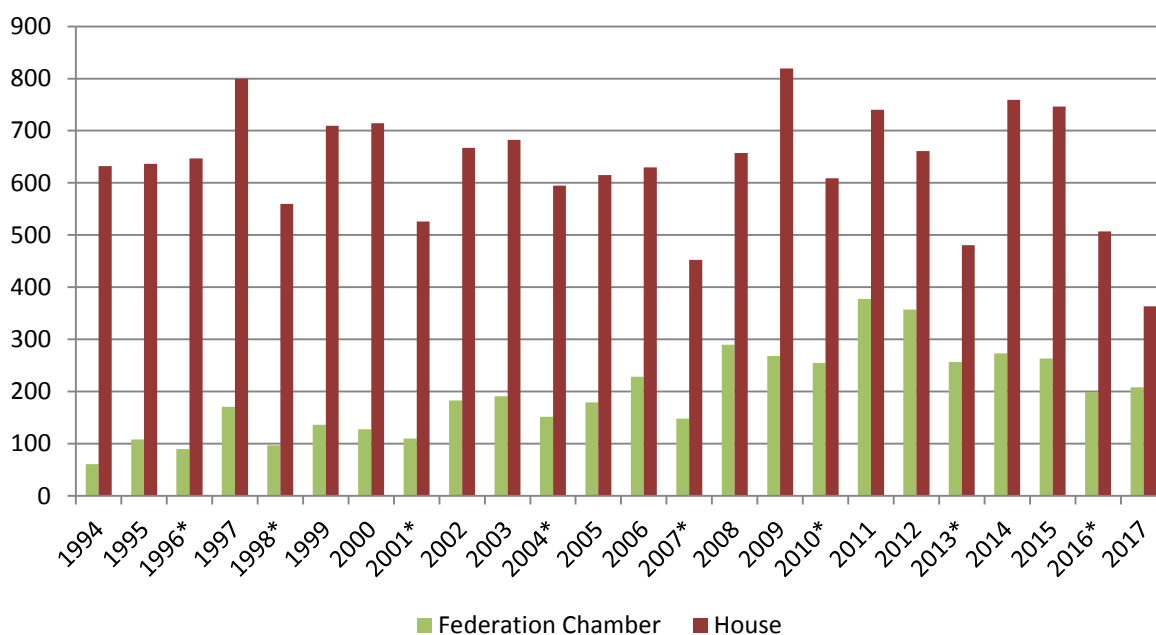
Other opportunities for private Members – includes adjournment and grievance debates.

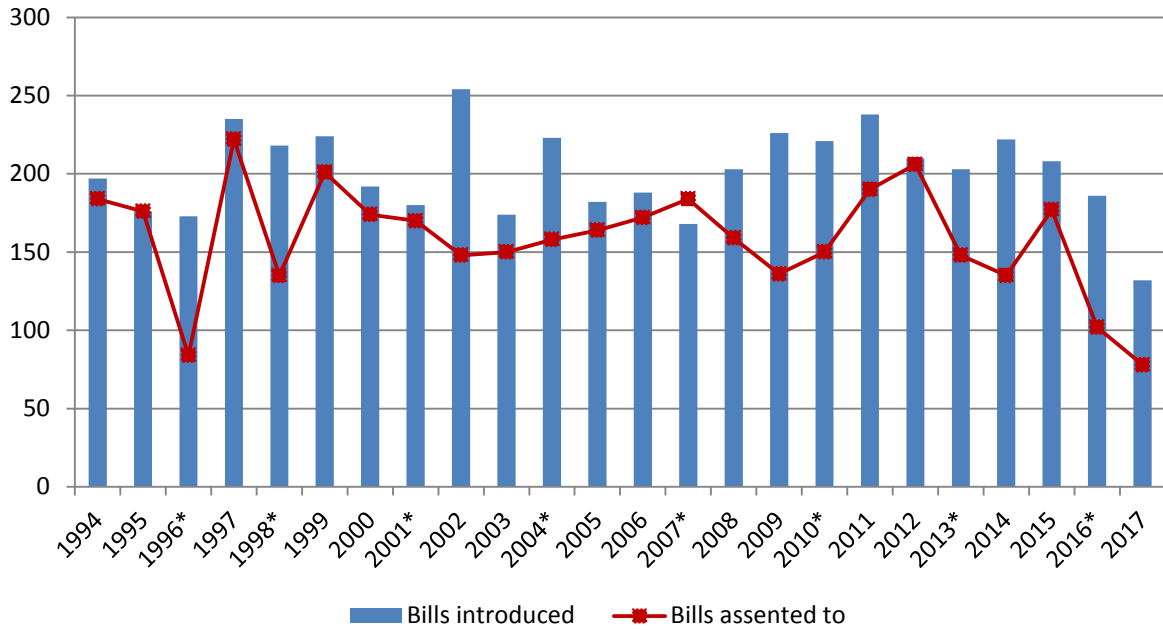

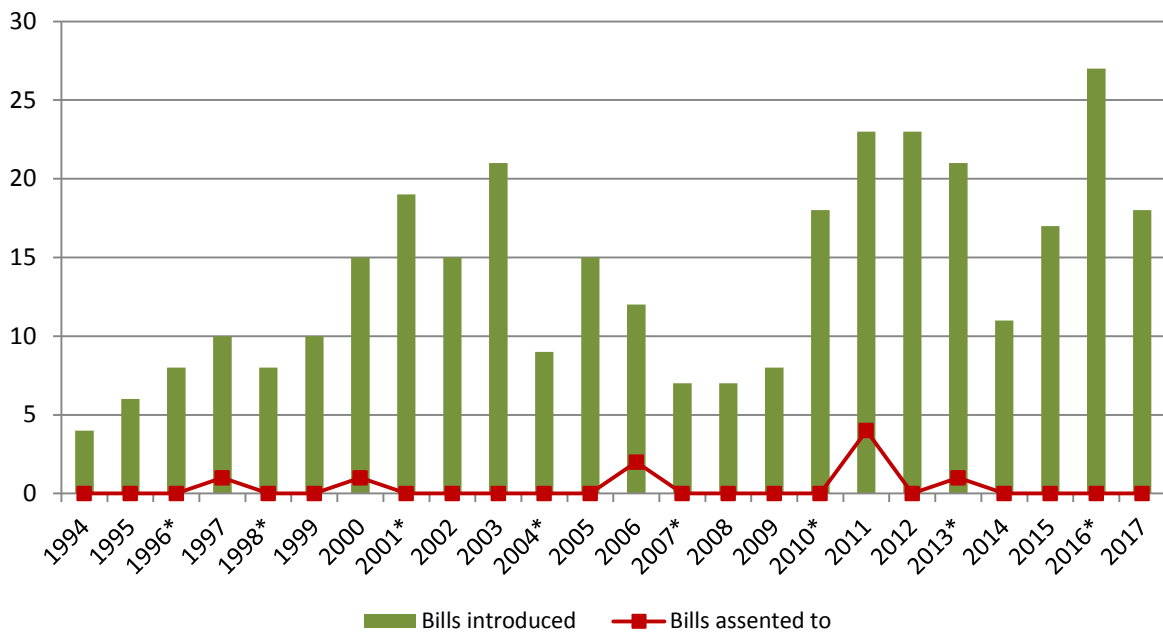

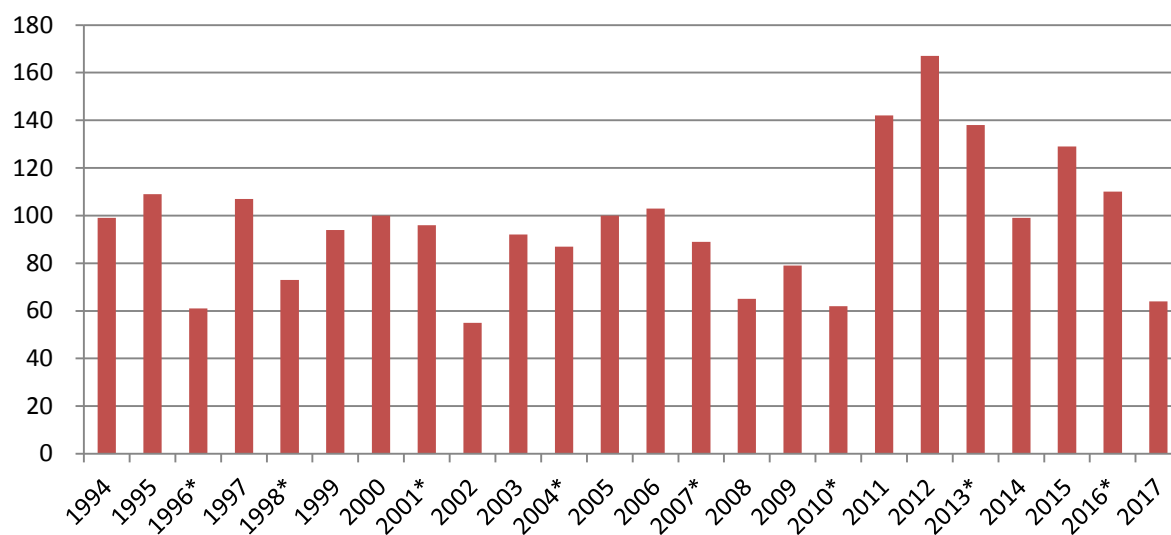
