## THE PARLIAMENTARY CALENDAR

### Parliament

A Parliament commences upon the first sitting day following a general election and concludes either at dissolution or at the expiry of three years from the first meeting of the House—whichever occurs first.

### Session

A session commences upon the first sitting day following a general election or prorogation and concludes either by prorogation (the formal ending of a session), dissolution or at the expiry of three years from the first meeting of the House.

### Sitting period

Sitting periods occur within a session. Sittings of the House in each calendar year are usually divided into distinct periods—the autumn, winter (or Budget) and spring sittings.

### Sitting

A sitting commences pursuant to the standing or sessional orders, or in accordance with a resolution of the House at a previous sitting, and concludes with the adjournment of the same sitting. The same sitting may extend over more than one day.

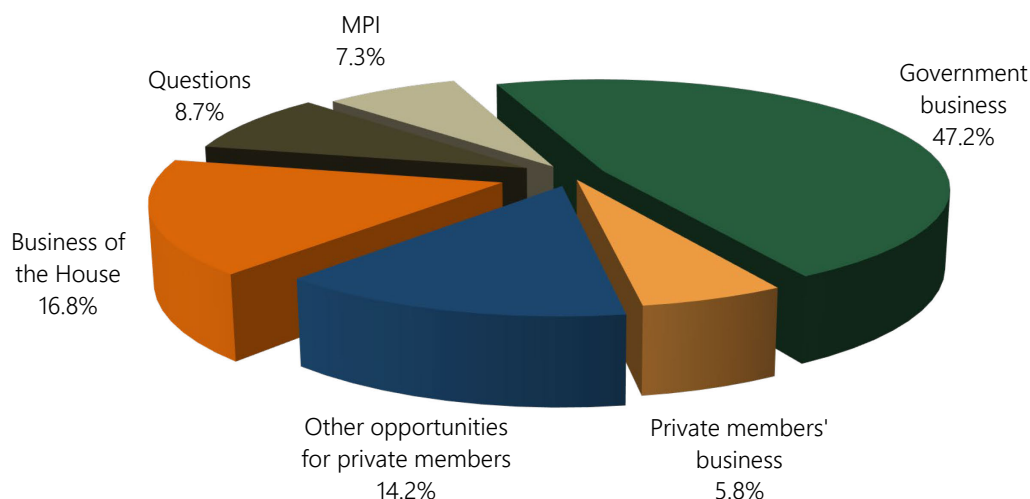

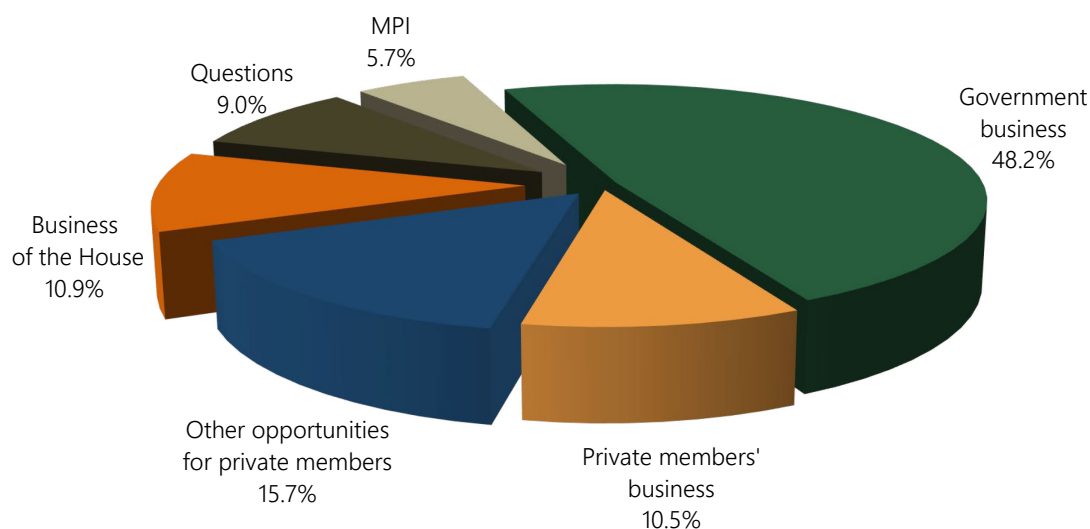

**Government business** includes government sponsored legislation and motions, ministerial statements and statements in reply.

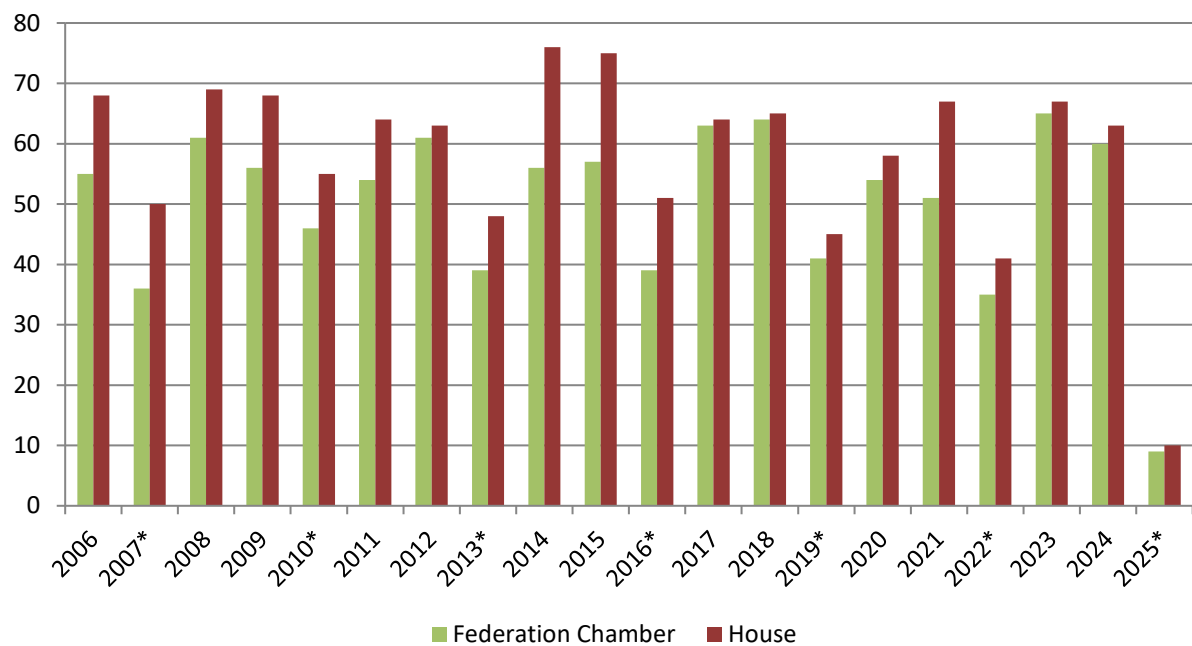
**Private members' business** includes legislation and motions sponsored by private members.

**Other opportunities for private members** includes adjournment debates, grievance debates, debate on the Address in Reply, 90 second statements and members' constituency statements.

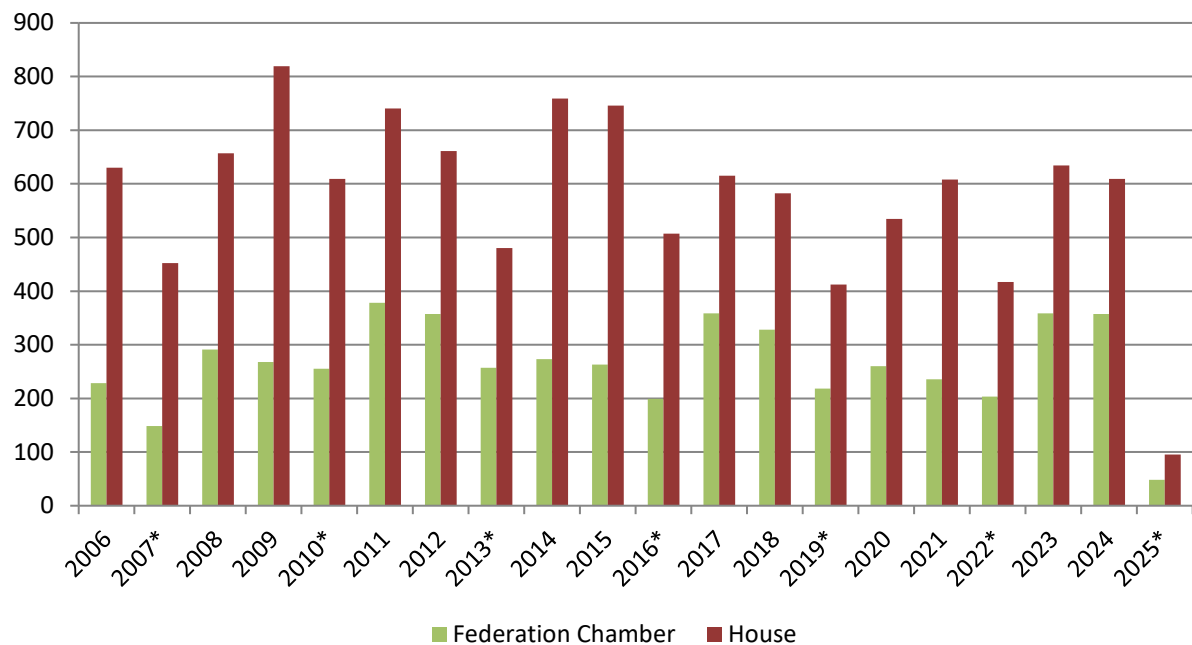

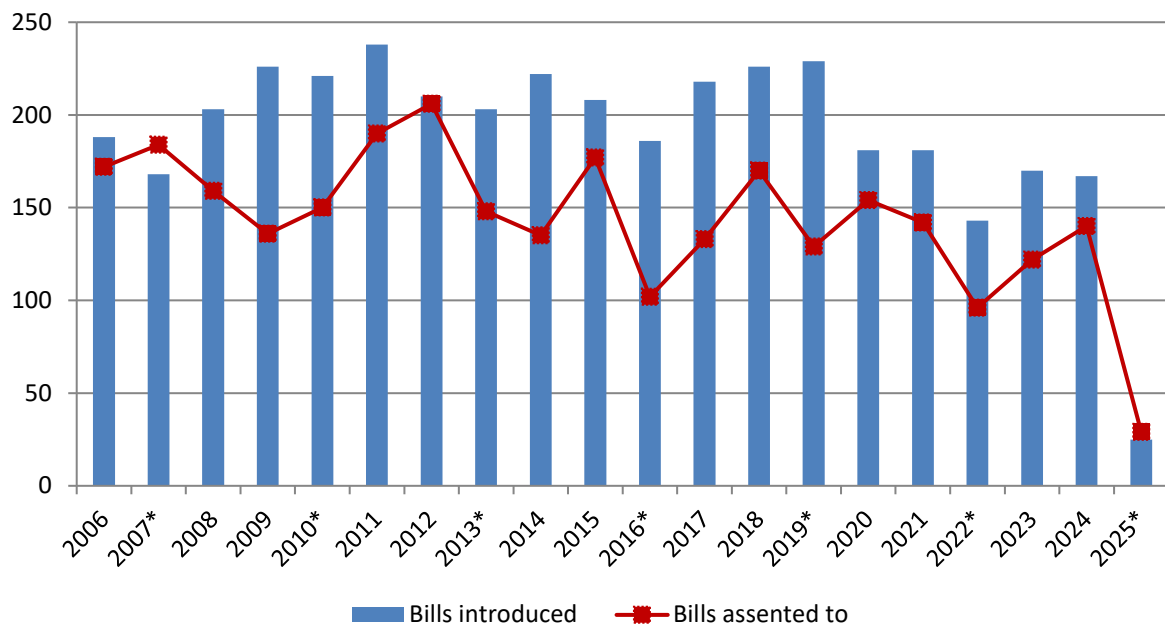

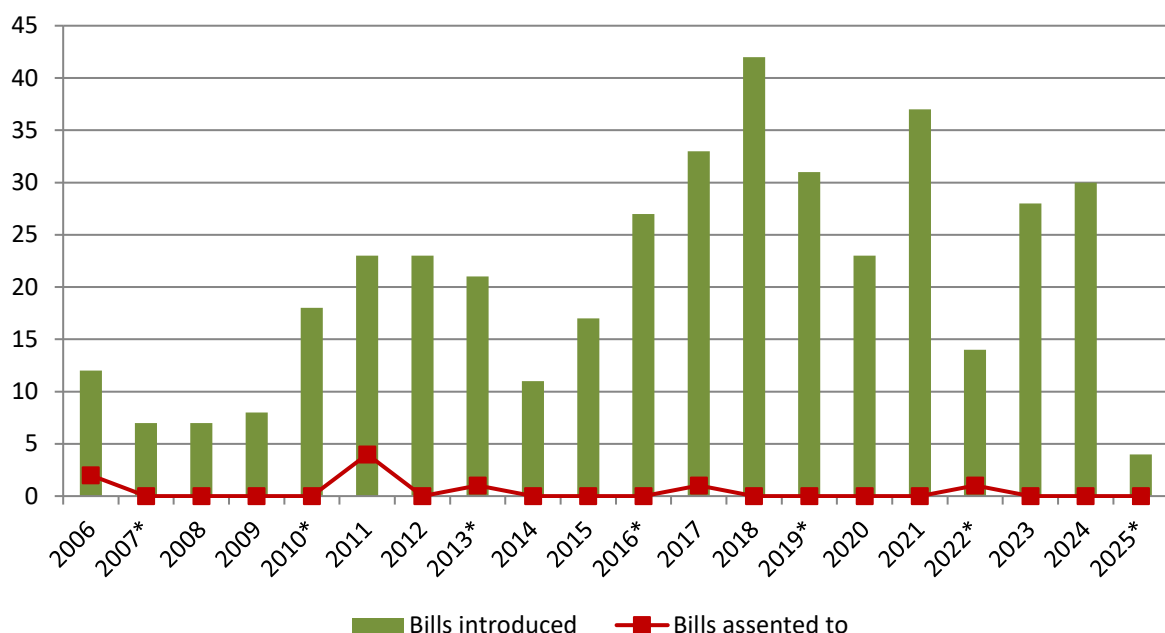

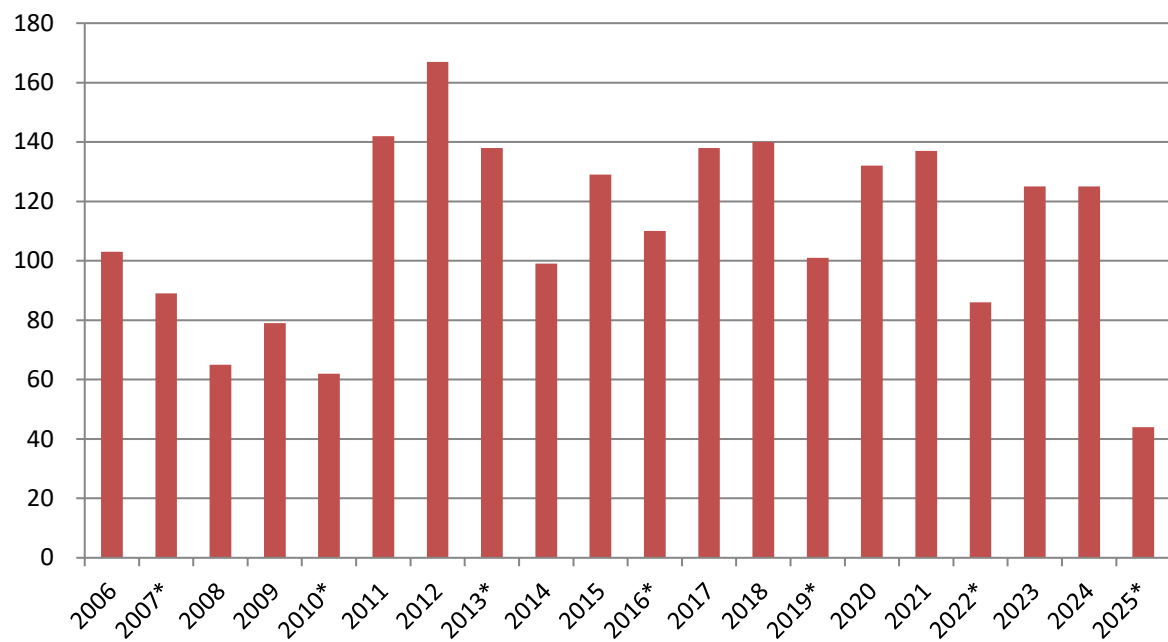

Members or ministers may be absent from the House on parliamentary or government business during sittings.

On 24 Aug 2020, the House adopted a resolution authorising an official video facility for members unable to attend sittings due to the COVID-19 pandemic to contribute to certain parliamentary proceedings. Members who made contributions in this way were recorded in the Votes and Proceedings as absent but were separately recorded as having 'participated by video link'.

On 8 Sep 2022, the House adopted a resolution allowing members granted leave of absence, and not physically present in Parliament House, to participate remotely in proceedings of the Federation Chamber by the official parliamentary video facility.

These facilities were not used during the 47th Parliament.
