The Australian Parliament

The Australian Constitution vests the legislative power of the Commonwealth in a Federal Parliament which consists of the Queen, the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The first Federal Parliament was opened by the Duke of Cornwall and York (later King George V) on 9 May 1901 in the Melbourne Exhibition Building.

Under an agreement between the Commonwealth and the Victorian Governments, the Commonwealth Parliament met in the Victorian Parliament House from 1901 to 1927, during which time the Victorian Parliament was housed in the Exhibition Building. This was expected to be a temporary arrangement, but the Commonwealth Parliament did not meet in the provisional Parliament House in Canberra until 9 May 1927. The permanent Parliament House, built on Capital Hill, was opened by Queen Elizabeth II on 9 May 1988, and the first sittings in the new building took place on 22 August 1988.

The centenary of the Parliament was celebrated in the Exhibition Building and the Victorian Parliament on 9 and 10 May 2001.

As noted above, the Parliament is bicameral. The holders of government office—the Executive or Ministry—are responsible to the people’s elected representatives, and their tenure of office is dependent upon their retention of the confidence of the Lower House.

By convention, the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition are members of the House of Representatives.

Senate

The Senate has 76 members. Each State elects 12 Senators from State-wide electorates for six-year, fixed terms. Two Senators are elected from each of the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory for three-year maximum terms that are tied to the terms of Members of the House of Representatives. For details of party representation in the Senate from 1901 see the table on p 464-5.

House of Representatives

The House of Representatives currently has 151 members elected from single-member electorates. The Constitution requires that the number of Members must be, ‘as nearly as practicable’, twice that of the number of State Senators. Slight variations in House numbers can occur due to changes in the States’ and Territories’ entitlements—since 1984 the number has ranged from 147 to 151 Members. The government

The Constitution provides that the Queen appoints a Governor-General to be her representative in Australia.

By convention, the Governor-General commissions the leader of the majority party or coalition in the House of Representatives to form a government. It is also a matter of convention to include a number of Senators in the Ministry.

The Hon. Scott Morrison MP was first sworn in as Prime Minister on 24 August 2018. Following the 2019 general election, the Morrison Ministry was sworn in on 29 May 2019. The first meeting of the 46th Parliament was on 2 July 2019. For full details of the Ministry, see pp. 21-3.

Legislation

Most Bills examined by Parliament are introduced by the government in the House of Representatives. Proposed laws appropriating revenue for the ordinary annual services of the government, or imposing taxation, can be introduced only in the House of Representatives. The Constitution imposes limitations on the power of the Senate over financial legislation, so that the Upper House may not amend such legislation, nor may it amend any proposed law so as to increase any proposed charge or financial burden on the people.

Legislative conflict

The Senate may reject any Bill. The Constitution provides a method for the resolution of any deadlock which may occur from the failure of the Senate to pass a Bill that has been passed by the House of Representatives. Under certain specified conditions, the Governor-General may dissolve both Houses, and elections for all House of Representatives and Senate seats are held. Such 'double dissolution' elections have been held in 1914, 1951, 1974, 1975, 1983, 1987 and 2016. If, after such an election, a disputed Bill is again rejected, it can be put to a joint sitting of both Houses. The only joint sitting to date was held in 1974.

Sitting periods

The Commonwealth Parliament must meet at least once each year. Before 1994 there were traditionally two sitting periods: Autumn (February–June) and Budget (August–December). Since 1994 there have been three sitting periods each calendar year: Autumn (February–March), Budget (May–June), and Spring (August–December). The earlier arrangement may be reverted to when the electoral cycle makes a May budget impracticable. The following table shows the number of sitting days and number of Acts passed for each year for the ten years prior to the 2019 election.

The Parliamentary record

The official record of the Senate is the *Journals of the Senate*, and that of the House of Representatives is the *Votes and Proceedings*. Parliamentary debates are recorded and published by the Department of Parliamentary Services as *Parliamentary Debates*, or *Hansard*. These contain the full text of speeches, petitions, notices of motion, questions without notice and the answers thereto, questions in writing and the answers thereto, and requests made to the Presiding Officers for detailed information concerning the Parliament.

The Sovereign

Elizabeth the Second, by the Grace of God, Queen of Australia and her other Realms and Territories, Head of the Commonwealth

Her Majesty Elizabeth Alexandra Mary, the daughter of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, ascended the throne on 6 February 1952, was proclaimed Queen on 8 February 1952 and was crowned at Westminster Abbey on 2 June 1953.

The Queen has visited Australia sixteen times during her reign. On three occasions Parliament has been opened by Her Majesty: 15 February 1954, 28 February 1974 and 8 March 1977. On 9 May 1988, Her Majesty opened the permanent Parliament House in Canberra, 61 years to the day after her father opened the provisional Parliament House.



The Governor-General



The Governor-General is appointed by the Queen, on the advice of the Australian Prime Minister, to be her representative in Australia, with powers as specified in the Constitution, and 'such powers and functions of the Queen as Her Majesty may be pleased to assign to him'.

As set out in the Constitution, the Governor-General exercises the following powers with respect to the Parliament: the appointment of times for parliamentary sessions, the prorogation or dissolution of Parliament, the appointment of the Ministry, and the declaration of Royal Assent to legislation passed by Parliament.

His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia

His Excellency General the Honourable David John Hurley AC DSC (Retd) was sworn in as the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia on 1 July 2019.

David Hurley joined the Australian Army in January 1972, graduating from the Royal Military College, Duntroon into the Royal Australian Infantry Corps. In a long and distinguished 42-year military career, his service culminated with his appointment as Chief of the Defence Force.

He commanded the 1st Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment during Operation SOLACE in Somalia in 1993, receiving the Distinguished Service Cross. Following promotion to Colonel, he was appointed Chief of Staff, Headquarters 1st Division in June 1994, attending the U.S. Army War College in 1996 and 1997. He commanded the 1st Brigade from 1999–2000 in Darwin, supporting Australian-led operations in East Timor. He was appointed the inaugural Chief of Capability Development Group from 2003–2007, Chief of Joint Operations Command in October 2007, and Vice Chief of the Defence Force in July 2008. Promoted to General, he succeeded Air Chief Marshal Angus Houston as Chief of the Defence Force on 4 July 2011 until his retirement on 30 June 2014. In 2010, he was appointed a Companion of the Order of Australia for eminent service to the Australian Defence Force.

Prior to being sworn in as Governor-General, David Hurley served as the 38th Governor of New South Wales from October 2014 – May 2019.

David Hurley was born in Wollongong, New South Wales on 26 August 1953, the son of Norma and James Hurley. His father was an Illawarra steelworker and his mother worked in a grocery store. He grew up in Port Kembla and attended Port Kembla High School where he completed his Higher School Certificate in 1971. He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts and Graduate Diploma in Defence Studies from the Royal Military College, Duntroon in 1975. He is married to Linda with whom he has three children: Caitlin, Marcus and Amelia.

He was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Letters from the University of Wollongong in 2013; a Doctor of the University, *honoris causa*, from the University of New South Wales in 2015; made a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Technology and Engineering in 2016; and awarded an Honorary Doctorate from Macquarie University in 2017.

Office holders

The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, known collectively as the Presiding Officers, are the principal office holders in the Parliament. The President of the Senate chairs meetings of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives chairs meetings of the House. The President and the Speaker are also the spokespersons for the Senate and the House of Representatives respectively, representing their chambers in dealings with the Governor-General, Executive Government, the other House, and those outside the Parliament and overseas.

The President and the Speaker also have ultimate responsibility for the administration of their respective departments (the Departments of the Senate and the House of Representatives)—a role analogous to that of ministers regarding government departments. Further, the Presiding Officers have joint responsibility for the Department of Parliamentary Services in its provision of services to all parliamentarians, as well as joint management and control of Parliament House and its surrounds.

Parliamentary party leaders and whips

Each parliamentary party (consisting of all parliamentarians belonging to the party) has a leader, who is elected according to party rules and processes. The leaders of the government party and the opposition party will be, respectively, the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition. Parliamentary party leaders play a leading role in their parties' activities within the Parliament, allocating parliamentary party positions and representing their parties to the electorate.

Parliamentary parties also maintain a number of positions known as 'whips', who carry out a range of duties for their parties, including managing chamber attendance for divisions, making pairing arrangements, and acting as tellers in divisions. Whips may also perform party duties outside of the parliamentary setting.
