In September 2007 I wrote to the British High Commission and sought to renounce any entitlement to British citizenship I may have.

On 23 October 2007 the British High Commission advised that under British law, grandchildren of British citizens do not have an entitlement to British citizenship by descent and that I did not need to make an application for renunciation.



Dear Mr Farrell,

I refer to your application to renounce British citizenship. From the information you have provided it does not appear that you would be eligible to hold British citizenship.

British citizenship is normally acquired by birth in the United Kingdom or for anyone born prior to 1 January 1983 by legitimate descent from a father born in the United Kingdom. From 1 January 1983 under the provisions of the British Nationality Act 1981, British born women were entitled to transmit their citizenship to their children born overseas but this was not made retrospective.

Although in certain circumstances British citizenship can be acquired through a British born grandparent this does not apply in your case. For you to acquire citizenship through your grandfather, your mother would have to be born in a place that was considered a British colony under the British Nationality Act. Although Australia formed part of the Crown's Dominions it was not considered a British Colony for nationality purposes. Therefore your mother would be considered a British citizen by descent, not by birth. British citizenship that is acquired by descent cannot be transmitted to a further generation born outside the United Kingdom.

As you are not automatically a British citizen it does not appear that you would need to make an application for renunciation.
