KP: I guess we all gotta tow the line, obviously because COVID is a serious thing and its dangerous I guess I have some questions as to how we are doing it as a precautionary measure. That sorta language suggests to me that maybe we shouldn't be doing this, it's a bit hard to understand, but the communication out of Darwin to Alice hasn't been that great since this started last weekend, so um, probably not surprised that the communication is still poor.

AA: This is the busiest time of the year in Central Australia, where businesses earn enough to compensate for the quieter hotter months, so Kyle Pierson thinks that the ramifications of the snap lockdown will be immense.

KP: Its all about the whole, 30 people that we employ that are casuals that are facing lost wages. We got to explain to people that we cant give them sifts, we cant open we cant trade.
