The department does not comment on the existence or progress of specific FOI requests. This protects the privacy of applicants and ensures that the department does not pre-empt decisions.

The Fee Free TAFE Skills Agreement provides a framework under which state and territory governments report information about what has been delivered under the agreement. These report schedules enable the Commonwealth to assess progress and make milestone payments.

The Fee Free TAFE Skills Agreement does not include states and territories agreement to publicly release their Fee Free TAFE quarterly reports. States and Territories have provided this data in confidence.

Question 23: Most up to date data on the number of in training apprentices and trainees, broken down by gender, age, state, and electorate.

The National Centre for Vocational Education Research (NCVER) is the national skills and training data custodian for all States, Territories and the Commonwealth. The most up to date data on the number of in training apprentices and trainees, broken down by gender, age and state is available at <u>Apprentices and trainees 2024</u>: June guarter
