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## Acknowledgement of Country

## Introduction

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The Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, Sport and the Arts' (the department) addendum submission to the Inquiry into Local Government Funding and Fiscal Sustainability (the Inquiry) updates key information from our May and December 2024 submissions to the lapsed Inquiry into local government sustainability. Our previous submissions aimed to illustrate the breadth and complexity of the work undertaken by the department to strengthen and enhance the sector as well as provide reflections and observations on the issues identified by the inquiry.

This addendum submission provides updated information regarding Commonwealth grants including the quantum of Commonwealth support and grant funding structure as well as additional information requested by the Committee. Figures have been updated to include results for the 2023-24 financial year, being the latest year for which full operating results have been published for all funding programs at the time of compilation. The department anticipates results for 2024-25 to be available in the second half of 2026.

The department continues to observe that the issue of local government sustainability is complex and goes beyond financial considerations. Many systemic factors influence the breadth, quality and costs of local government services while other constraints beyond the control of local government can impact its capacity to plan for and deliver against its obligations.


State and territory governments are responsible for ensuring that the systems of baseline operational funding to their local governments are sufficient, and supplementing them wherever they fall short, to enable services to be delivered to respective communities. However, all levels of government will exert influence over the systems that affect the efficacy and cost of local government services. Solutions to improve the sector's fiscal sustainability will require careful consideration of these interdependent systems and fostering collaboration across governments and stakeholders to effect systemic change.

# Quantum of Commonwealth Support

## Commonwealth commitments to local government

**Figure 1** below provides total funding committed by the Commonwealth to local governments from 2019-20 to 2023-24, which was approximately \$24.1 billion. Funding committed to local government includes both direct funding specifically targeted at local government and indirect funding for which local governments are eligible as reported on GrantConnect. During this period average annual commitments of approximately \$4.8 billion were made to local governments, with most of the funding provided through the untied Financial Assistance Grant program (FA Grant).

## Commonwealth commitments to local government by agency from 2019-20 to 2023-24.

**Figure 2** provides the Commonwealth's commitment to local government by agency from 2019-20 to 2023-24. During this period the department was responsible for administering \$21.7 billion or 90.1% of the Commonwealth's total commitment. Most of this funding, \$13.9 billion or 57.7%, is provided under the untied FA Grant. Roads to Recovery (RTR) and the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) programs provide approximately 23% of the total Commonwealth commitment.

Totals over the period are influenced by the impact of funding made available in response to COVID-19 and natural disaster events alongside other budget considerations taken by Government.



## Commonwealth commitments to local government by ABS remoteness.

Regional, rural and remote councils are the biggest beneficiaries of the Commonwealth’s funding committed to local governments. Of the total \$24.1 billion committed to local government over the period, almost \$15.5 billion or 65% has been committed to councils outside of major cities. On average, the Commonwealth commits \$4.8 billion annually in funding to local governments, of which, \$3.1 billion is provided to councils in rural, regional and remote areas.

**Figure 3** below provides a graphical representation, by financial year, of the allocation between Major Cities of Australia and those councils position in Inner Regional, Outer Regional, Remote and Very Remote. The allocation is largely consistent across the five-year period.

**Figure 3: Commonwealth commitments to local government by ABS remoteness.**



## Commonwealth commitments to local government as a percentage of taxation revenue

Figure 4 below shows overall Commonwealth support to the local government sector has remained approximately equal to 1% of Commonwealth Taxation Revenue over time, reflecting the balance of priorities for successive governments.

While this figure demonstrates funding available directly to local governments, it should be noted that local governments also benefit from the on-flow of Commonwealth funding provided to the states and territories through general revenue assistance and federation funding agreements. Such funding totalled \$176 billion in 2023-24. This included almost \$85 billion provided in addition to GST payments, over 15% of GST-excluded Commonwealth Taxation Revenue<sup>1</sup>.

## DITRDCA commitments to local government by type (tied vs untied)

Most of the Commonwealth funding commitments administered by the department supplement the financial capacity of local governments to carry out operational functions, while the remaining proportion of funding derives from targeted grant opportunities designed to achieve specific policy objectives of the Australian Government. Funding provided by grants and investment programs can be organised into the following terms according to their characteristics:

1. **Untied Funding** – funding which is provided with no conditions or reporting requirements.
2. **Semi-untied Funding** – funding which allows proponents to direct spending towards local priorities, and funding which may incur light-touch reporting requirements.
3. **Merit Based** – funding which is provided following an independent or officials’ assessment, or ministerial decision, and is disbursed in accordance with a specified merit criterion. Such funding may also incur certain reporting and accountability requirements.


Of the \$21.7 billion in funding committed to local government (refer **Figure 2**), through programs administered by the department, in the period between 2019-20 to 2023-24:

- 63% was provided untied through the FA Grant.
- 24% was provided through semi-untied programs, including, R2R and LRCI.
- 13% was provided through other competitive, merit-based programs.

When excluding major cities, the data (refer **Figure 5**) shows regional councils receive a slightly higher percentage of their funding through untied or semi-tied programs.

- 66% was provided untied through the FA Grant.
- 27% was provided through semi-untied programs, including, R2R and LRCI.
- 7% was provided through other competitive, merit-based programs.

# Appendix A: Department administered programs and initiatives which support local government.

Details on the various programs administered by the department with relevance for local governments are listed in the index below.

It should be noted that in addition to programs which exclusively fund local governments, this list includes programs open to local government but for which other tiers of government and stakeholders may also apply. Furthermore, some programs may provide benefit to local governments but do not directly fund them. As such, the totals made available through these programs may exceed the funding provided to local government.

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| To date, more than \$1 billion in funding has been invested to deliver up to 1,400 new mobile base stations across Australia through competitive, merit-based grant opportunities. Under Round 7, \$55 million (GST inclusive) in Commonwealth funding was awarded to deliver mobile coverage solutions to regional, rural and remote Australia. The MBSP is supported by co-contributions from state and territory, and local governments, and grantees. The funding commitment for the MBSP Round 8 is \$50 million (GST exclusive), with outcomes of the round expected to be announced in early 2026. In April 2025, the Australian Government announced a commitment of \$9.8 million (GST exclusive) to boost mobile coverage and tower capacity in the Local Government Areas of West Coast, Waratah Wynyard and Circular Head on the West Coast Tasmania. Applications from MNOs and MNIPs is expected to open in early 2026. .... | 20        |
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## Financial Assistance Grant (FA Grant)

**Commencement:** 1974.

### Program Description:

The Financial Assistance Grant (FA Grant) is administered in accordance with the *Local Government (Financial Assistance) Act 1995* (the Act). By the end of 2025-26, the Australian Government will have provided over \$74 billion to local government under the FA Grant program since 1974-75. The FA Grant represents one of the only sources of untied funding available to local governments, allowing councils to spend the funds according to local priorities.

### Supplementary funding to South Australia for local roads:

This supplementary funding is to address an anomaly in the allocation of fixed historical road shares for the FA Grant. South Australia is provided with 5.5% of funding for local roads even though it manages 11.7%.

In the 2023-24 Budget, the Government recommitted \$20.0 million (annually to 2025-26) to South Australia as supplementary funding for local roads. The project agreement was executed on 28 August 2023 with the payment for 2023-24 made to South Australia on 29 August 2023.

The Government has provided this funding since 2004-05.

This funding lapses on 30 June 2026. A decision to extend this funding is a matter for the government to consider in the context of the 2026-27 Budget.

## Infrastructure Group

### *Active Transport Fund*

**Commencement:** 2024.

**Program Description:**

The aim of the Active Transport Fund (ATF) is to encourage an increase in active transport through the upgrade of existing and construction of new bicycle and walking pathways across Australia.

The program has been created as part of the Australian Government's commitment, under the National Road Safety Strategy 2021-30, to improve road safety outcomes for people walking, wheeling, and riding. The program also supports the Australian Government's commitment to reducing transport emissions and supporting active and liveable communities. The applications were open to all state and territory governments and Local Government Authorities (LGAs), and applications were required to directly address at least one of the program's focus areas which are linked to active transport priorities. Around 93% of approved projects are LGA-led.

**Program Funding:**

\$100m committed from 2024-25 to 2028-29 (fully allocated).

### *Black Spot Program*

**Commencement:** 1996.

**Program Description:**

The Black Spot Program funds safety measures such as traffic lights, roundabouts, safety barriers, and pedestrian treatments at locations where crashes are occurring, or are at risk of occurring. Anyone can nominate a site for funding under the Black Spot Program. Nominations are assessed and prioritised through state and territory road and infrastructure departments with Consultative Panels considering and recommending these nominations to the Minister. Funding for approved projects is paid to states and territories, who distribute funds to LGAs as required.

**Program Funding:**

Ongoing program providing \$150 million per year from 2025-26. State allocations are based on crash data, population and vehicle kilometres travelled.

### *Safer Local Roads and Infrastructure Program*

**Commencement:** 2024

**Program Description:**

The Safer Local Roads and Infrastructure Program (SLRIP) was created as part of the Australian Government's commitment to strengthen investment to support the delivery of safer and more productive roads across Australia. It is an application based, merit-assessed funding program, open to all state and territory governments and Local Government Authorities. Applications must directly address at least one of the program's focus areas (Road safety, Productivity, Bridge renewal, Road resilience, Road sustainability, and Heavy vehicle rest areas) which are linked to priorities in road infrastructure needs.

The SLRIP consolidated the Bridges Renewal Program (BRP) and Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program (HVSPP) into a single program and includes additional new focus areas for funding. The Heavy Vehicle Rest Area Initiative (HVRA) has been included under the program with its own funding stream and focus area (see also separate entry below).

**Program Funding:**

Ongoing program providing at least \$200 million per year.

### ***Heavy Vehicle Rest Area (HVRA) Initiative***

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

The HVRA initiative supports construction of new and upgrades to heavy vehicle rest areas to improve safety by ensuring there are enough appropriately located heavy vehicle rest stops, with appropriate amenities. Heavy vehicle drivers benefit from improved facilities to rest, to enable them to be more productive and efficient, and other road users will also benefit from a safer road transport network. State and territory, and local governments are eligible to submit nominations on an ongoing basis. From 1 July 2024 the program sits as a separate funding stream under the Safer Local Roads and Infrastructure Program.

**Program Funding:**

\$140 million over 10 years to 2032-33.

### ***Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program***

**Commencement:** 2020.

**Program Description:**

The LRCI program was established as a temporary stimulus program in 2020 to support local government to deliver improved road safety, accessibility, and visual amenity, and create jobs and ongoing community benefits. 551 organisations receive funding under the program, including local governments, state and territory authorities for unincorporated areas, and non-state entities (for Norfolk Island and the Indian Ocean Territories).

The department regularly engages directly with local government funding recipients and with the Australian Local Government Association to assist with communications to councils.

**Program Funding:**

A total of \$3.25 billion has been made available across 4 phases of the LRCI program. Phase 4 funding allocations include an additional \$250 million targeted to improve rural, regional, and outer urban roads.

The LRCI program ceases 30 June 2026.

### ***Remote Roads Upgrade Pilot Program (RRUPP)***

**Commencement:** 2021.

**Program Description:**

The RRUPP targets road improvements for regional and remote communities and addresses significant deficiencies on key regional and rural roads that limit community access, pose safety risks, and impact the economic development of the surrounding area.

**Program Funding:**

\$150 million has been made available to 2025-26.

### ***Roads to Recovery (RTR) Program***

**Commencement:** 2001.

**Program Description:**

The RTR program was established to support the maintenance of the nation's local road infrastructure assets, which facilitates greater accessibility, and improves safety, economic and social outcomes for Australians. 552 organisations receive funding under the program, including local governments, state authorities and Local Government Associations for unincorporated areas, and non-state entities (for Norfolk Island and the Indian Ocean Territories).

Funding allocations for each local governing body are calculated according to a formula based on population and road length set by the relevant Local Government Grants Commission. The department regularly engages directly with local government funding recipients and with the Australian Local Government Association to assist with communications to councils.

**Program Funding:**

The RTR program operates on a five-year funding period, with \$4.4 billion made available over the current period from 2024 to 2029, with annual funding increasing to \$1 billion per year from 2027-28.

***National Road Safety Action Grants Program (NRSAGP)***

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

The NRSAGP is designed to reduce the impact of road trauma and foster a national road safety culture. NRSAGP focuses on five key areas of activity critical to the delivery of the National Road Safety Action Plan:

1. Community Education and Awareness, including workplace road safety.
2. Vulnerable Road Users.
3. First Nations road safety.
4. Technology and Innovation.
5. Research and Data.

**Program Funding:**

\$43.6 million has been made available to deliver key non-infrastructure commitments in the National Road Safety Action Plan 2023-25.

***National Safety Action Plan 2023-25***

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

The Office of Road Safety manages the Intergovernmental Steering Committee on Road Safety (ISCRS), which oversees implementation of the National Road Safety Action Plan 2023-25 (the Action Plan). The Action Plan implements the National Road Safety Strategy 2021-30, which aims to reduce road fatalities by 50%, and serious injuries by 30%, by 2030.

ISCRS is chaired by the First Assistant Secretary, Road and Vehicle Safety Division, and includes representatives from all state and territory road transport agencies as well as the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA). The Action Plan includes Australian Government, and state and territory commitments to help support local government road safety capability and recognises the importance of local government as managers of a large part of the road network. Through the ISCRS, ALGA is able to monitor implementation of the Action Plan, its impact on local government, and ensure local government concerns are represented.

**Program Funding:**

Under the Action Plan, the Australian Government has committed to develop a framework to assist local governments to undertake risk assessments of their networks and prioritise road safety infrastructure investment. The department has engaged the Australasian College of Road Safety to develop the framework, with input from local governments and ALGA. The framework is due late-2024. The cost of the project is \$249,975. A second Australian Government commitment will include the delivery of training to local governments in the use of this framework and will be delivered in late 2024.

## Sport, Territories and Regions Group

### *City and Regional Deals and the Albury Wodonga Regional Projects*

**Commencement:** 2016.

**Program Description:**

City and Regional Deals and the Albury Wodonga Regional Projects provide place-based investment to enhance Australia's urban and regional areas, while recognising the important role of local government in land use planning and community engagement. Commitments are negotiated and agreed between the three levels of government, the private sector, and the community to meet the needs of specific places.

Deals and the Albury Wodonga Regional Projects work to align the investment, planning and governance necessary to accelerate growth and job creation, stimulate urban renewal, reduce congestion, and drive economic reforms.

**Program Funding:**

\$9.4 billion has been made available through the City and Regional Deal model, which also includes the Australian Government's funding through the Albury Wodonga Regional Projects.

### *Central Australia Plan Community Infrastructure Package (CIP)*

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

The CIP supports the construction of new, or upgrades to existing, community infrastructure for Central Desert and MacDonnell regional councils. Proposed projects must fill an identified need for the community or provide economic and social benefits by improving community amenity and liveability in Central Australia.

The CIP has been developed in partnership between the Australian and Northern Territory Governments, and the Office of the Central Australian Regional Controller in response to the urgent challenges facing the communities in Alice Springs and Central Australia and is in line with the National Agreement on Closing the Gap.

**Program Funding:**

\$50 million of funding has been made available, including \$5.2 million identified for allocation across 9 projects.

### *regional Precincts and Partnerships Program (rPPP)*

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

The rPPP supports precinct development proposals, as well as the delivery of construction-ready precinct projects across regional, rural and remote Australia. Through collaborative partnerships engaging in design, stewardship and accountability of planned outcomes, the rPPP will facilitate place-based approaches to planning and reflect the government's approach to regional investment as outlined under the regional investment framework.

**Program Funding:**

\$400 million has been made available from 2023-24 to 2026-27.

### ***urban Precincts and Partnerships Program (uPPP)***

**Commencement:** 2024

**Program Description:**

The uPPP supports precinct development proposals, as well as the delivery of construction-ready precinct projects in urban areas. Through collaborative partnerships engaging in design, stewardship and accountability of planned outcomes, the uPPP will facilitate place-based approaches to planning and provide targeted benefits related to productivity, equity, and resilience for the people of urban Australia.

**Program Funding:**

\$150 million has been made available from 2024-25 to 2027-28.

### ***Major and Local Community Infrastructure Program (MLCIP)***

**Commencement:** September 2025

**Program Description:**

The MLCIP aims to build resilient communities through the provision of social and community facilities that improve community amenity, accessibility and liveability and help to drive economic growth in communities and the broader region.

Only organisations nominated by the Australian Government were invited to apply for funding. Eligible applications are assessed individually.

**Program Funding:**

Around \$570 million has been made available under the program from 2025-26 to 2028-29.

### ***Priority Community Infrastructure Program (PCIP)***

**Commencement:** February 2023.

**Program Description:**

The PCIP promotes building resilient communities through the provision of social and community facilities; improving community amenity, accessibility and liveability through investment in community infrastructure; and driving economic growth in communities and the broader region.

The PCIP delivers grant funding typically of \$5 million or more and only applicants nominated by the Australian Government were invited to apply for funding. Eligible applications were assessed individually.

**Program Funding:**

Around \$950 million has been made available under the program from 2022-23 to 2026-27.

### ***Investing in Our Communities (IIOC)***

**Commencement:** February 2023.

**Program Description:**

The IIOC Program aims to enhance community infrastructure; encourage community cohesion; and have a positive impact on economic activity within communities. The IIOC program delivers grant funding of up to \$5 million and only applicants nominated by the Australian Government were invited to apply for funding. Eligible applications were assessed individually.

**Program Funding:**

More than \$325.9 million has been made available from 2022-23 to 2026-27.

### ***Growing Regions Program***

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

The Growing Regions Program promotes the delivery of community-focused infrastructure which contributes to local and regional priorities, improving equity and supporting diverse social inclusion, and enhancing amenity and liveability in the regions. The Australian Government provides grants between \$500,000 and \$15 million to local government entities and incorporated not-for-profit organisations outside the Greater Capital City Statistical Areas for capital works projects that deliver community and economic infrastructure projects across regional, rural and remote Australia.

**Program Funding:**

\$600 million was made available through two open and competitive rounds from 2023-24.

### ***Thriving Suburbs Program***

**Commencement:** 2024

**Program Description:**

The Thriving Suburbs Program provides funding for capital works for community and economic infrastructure that enhances liveability and prosperity in urban, suburban and peri-urban communities inside the Greater Capital City Statistical Areas. This will assist to deliver investment in locally driven urban and suburban infrastructure and community projects.

**Program Funding:**

\$350 million was made available through one open and competitive round from 2024-25.

### ***Stronger Communities Programme (SCP)***

**Commencement:** 2015.

**Program Description:**

SCP promotes participation in local projects, improved community participation and contributions to vibrant and viable communities. It delivers infrastructure projects that provide social benefits for local communities, funding small capital projects in each of Australia's 151 federal electorates. The program enables each electorate to receive up to 20 projects with funding ranging from \$2,500 to \$20,000.

**Program Funding:**

\$22.7 million was made available for Round 9 of the program, which was delivered as a closed non-competitive opportunity.

### ***Community Development Grants (CDG) Programme***

**Commencement:** 2013.

**Program Description:**

The CDG programme delivered construction and upgrades to facilities to provide long term improvements to the social and economic viability of local communities; promoted job creation in the delivery of these projects; and improved social amenity, increased health and wellbeing and social cohesion by utilisation of the infrastructure by community groups.

**Program Funding:**

\$2.4 billion was made available under the program for projects to be completed between 2013-14 and 2025-26, delivered via closed, non-competitive grant opportunities. The program will close 30 June 2026.

## Transport Group

### *Regional Airports Program (RAP)*

**Commencement:** 2019.

**Program Description:**

The RAP promotes aviation safety and access for regional communities. It assists eligible airport owners in inner and outer regional areas to improve access and safety at airports and for Round 4 and 5 assists with transitioning air services to net zero. Most regional airports are owned or managed by local governments who are eligible to apply for grant funding.

**Program Funding:**

Over four rounds, 239 projects have been awarded over \$123 million in grant funding, with a further round anticipated in 2026.

### *Remote Airstrip Upgrade (RAU) Program*

**Commencement:** 2011.

**Program Description:**

The RAU program is an element of the Regional Aviation Access Program (RAAP) and supports enhanced safety and accessibility at eligible aerodromes in remote and very remote locations. This includes local governments that own or manage a remote aerodrome. Safe, operational aerodromes are vital in the delivery of essential goods and services in remote and very remote communities, particularly where road access is unavailable, unreliable or disrupted for extended periods due to seasonal weather conditions. An effective airstrip, accessible all year round, improves the delivery of health care services such as those provided by the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) or other aeromedical providers, improves access to work and education opportunities and helps connect residents of remote communities.

**Program Funding:**

As part of the 2024-25 Budget funding for \$50 million was announced to extend the program for a further two rounds, with outcomes for the first of these rounds announced in October 2025. Over 11 rounds, 512 projects have been awarded grant funding of over \$140 million, with a further round anticipated in 2026.

### *Strategic Local Government Asset Assessment Project (SLGAAP)*

**Commencement:** 2019-20.

**Program Description:**

The SLGAAP is provided under the National Land Transport Act 2014 (NLT Act) Parts 4 and 5. SLGAAP provides funding to assist local government road managers for the purpose of improving:

- Safety and productivity of heavy vehicle operators.
- Capacity of local government road managers to assess applications for access to local road infrastructure by a larger range of heavy vehicles, including oversize over-mass vehicles.
- Capacity of road freight operators to consider the safety requirements of their journey.
- Safe use of road infrastructure assets and increase road freight productivity.
- Collection of local government asset data to feed into the development of a national automated access system for heavy vehicles.

This provides information on safe operating limits of road infrastructure and facilitates safe access for heavy vehicles. In 2024-25 the expansion and extension of the project under phase 3 will directly assist local government, enabling a greater number of more accurate and timely asset assessments which will feed into

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the national automated road access system for heavy vehicles. A national automated access system will improve productivity by replacing case-by-case permits for heavy vehicle access.

**Program Funding:**

More than \$42 million has been made available from 2019-20 to 2028-29 including \$22.3 million in additional funding which was announced in the 2023-24 Budget.

## Communications and Media Group

### *Mobile Black Spot Program (MBSP)*

**Commencement:** 2015.

**Program Description:**

The MBSP invests in telecommunications infrastructure to improve mobile coverage and competition across Australia. The MBSP awards grant funding to Mobile Network Operators (MNOs) and Mobile Network Infrastructure Providers (MNIPs) to deploy new mobile network infrastructure.

Local governments can engage with the MBSP in several ways including providing in-kind financial contributions and consultation to MNOs and MNIPs. Local governments are also involved in the delivery of funded solutions, through providing relevant land and building approvals. While local governments are not the direct beneficiaries of the MBSP, the deployment of new or upgraded mobile phone infrastructure benefits communities in local government areas where funded solutions are built.

**Program Funding:**

To date, more than \$1 billion in funding has been invested to deliver up to 1,400 new mobile base stations across Australia through competitive, merit-based grant opportunities. Under Round 7, \$55 million (GST inclusive) in Commonwealth funding was awarded to deliver mobile coverage solutions to regional, rural and remote Australia. The MBSP is supported by co-contributions from state and territory, and local governments, and grantees. The funding commitment for the MBSP Round 8 is \$50 million (GST exclusive), with outcomes of the round expected to be announced in early 2026. In April 2025, the Australian Government announced a commitment of \$9.8 million (GST exclusive) to boost mobile coverage and tower capacity in the Local Government Areas of West Coast, Waratah Wynyard and Circular Head on the West Coast Tasmania. Applications from MNOs and MNIPs is expected to open in early 2026.

### **Mobile Network Hardening Program (MNHP)**

**Commencement:** 2020.

**Program Description:**

The MNHP provides grant opportunities for mobile network operators and infrastructure providers to improve the resilience of Australia's regional and peri-urban mobile telecommunications network infrastructure, supporting communities during and when recovering from natural disasters.

Local governments are also involved in the delivery of funded projects through providing relevant land and building approvals. While local governments are not the direct beneficiaries of the MNHP, the deployment of resilience upgrades to mobile telecommunications network infrastructure benefits communities in local government areas across peri-urban, regional, remote and very remote Australia.

**Program Funding:**

The MNHP has provided over \$45 million (GST exclusive) in grant funding for over 1,680 resilience upgrade projects. Funding is being delivered through three rounds of targeted competitive grants and one ad-hoc grant opportunity. In April 2025, the Australian Government announced a further commitment of \$1.2 million to upgrade the resilience of telecommunications infrastructure in the Perth Hills region (Western Australia). The MNHP is also supported by co-contributions from state and territory governments and grantees.

### ***Peri-Urban Mobile Program (PUMP)***

**Commencement:** 2021-22.

**Program Description:**

The PUMP provides funding to mobile network operators (MNOs) and mobile network infrastructure providers (MNIPs) to deploy new or upgraded mobile phone infrastructure to address mobile reception and quality of service issues in the peri-urban fringe areas of major cities that are at risk of bushfires and other natural disasters.

Local governments are encouraged to provide in-kind contributions and consultation to MNOs. PUMP was promoted to local governments through the Australian Local Government Association's news bulletin on 29 January 2024. Local Governments are also involved in the delivery of funded projects through providing relevant land and building approvals. While local governments are not the direct beneficiaries of PUMP, the deployment of new or upgraded mobile phone infrastructure benefits communities in local government areas located in the peri-urban fringe of Australia's major cities.

**Program Funding:**

\$69.1 million (GST inclusive) has been committed under rounds 1 and 2 of PUMP towards mobile coverage solutions at 97 sites in the peri-urban fringe of Australia's major cities. The PUMP is supported by co-contributions from state governments and grantees.

### ***Regional Connectivity Program (RCP)***

**Commencement:** 2020-21.

**Program Description:**

The RCP targets investment in telecommunications infrastructure projects which respond to local priorities, with the objective of maximising 'place-based' economic opportunities and social benefits for regional, rural and remote communities and businesses. The program aims to improve digital connectivity by strengthening economic growth, assisting progress towards Target 17 of the Closing the Gap initiative, supporting regional development, and reducing the digital divide between rural and metropolitan locations.

The RCP complements the National Broadband Network (NBN) and the Government's Mobile Black Spot Program by targeting the delivery of new and improved access to broadband and mobile connectivity in areas outside of the NBN fixed-line footprint.

In addition to being able to join a consortia application, local governments have the opportunity to engage with the RCP in a number of ways including providing in-kind financial contributions and consultation on priority areas. Local governments are also involved in the delivery of funded projects, through providing relevant land and building approvals. While local governments are not the direct beneficiaries of the RCP, the deployment of new and improved access to broadband and mobile connectivity benefits communities in local government areas in regional, remote and very remote Australia.

**Program Funding:**

\$115.2 million (GST inclusive) in funding has been made available to deliver projects in Round 3 of the program, funded under the *Better Connectivity Plan for Regional and Rural Australia*. Prior to this \$117.9 million in funding was made available for Round 1, and a further \$137.2 million made available for Round 2. The RCP is supported by co-contributions from state, territory and local governments and grantees.

### ***Regional Roads Australia Mobile Program (RRAMP)***

**Commencement:** Pilot programs: 2023; National program: expected to open to applications in 2026

**Program Description:**

The RRAMP is an Australian Government initiative to improve multi-carrier mobile coverage on highways, major roads and adjacent communities in regional and remote Australia. The RRAMP will deliver mobile coverage in areas that are currently underserved, supporting economic growth, improving social connectivity, and improving the safety of drivers.

State and territory governments are delivering pilot programs to test new and innovative solutions to improve mobile coverage. Pilot programs will fund new, or the expansion of existing, infrastructure, with outcomes informing the design of the scaled-up National Program. Local governments may be encouraged to contribute to proposed projects and provide advice on potential project locations. While local governments are not the direct beneficiaries of the RRAMP, increased coverage on regional highways and major roads will benefit communities in local government areas in regional and remote Australia.

The Australian Government consulted with industry and stakeholders on the design features of the National RRAMP between March and June 2025. The National RRAMP is expected to open for applications in 2026.

**Program Funding:**

An initial \$50 million in funding has been made available to the RRAMP Pilot Programs, through the *Better Connectivity Plan for Regional and Rural Australia*

### ***Regional Telecommunications Review***

**Commencement:** 2024.

**Program Description:**

The Regional Telecommunications Review is undertaken by an appointed Committee every 3 years and considers the adequacy of telecommunications services in regional, rural and remote parts of Australia. In undertaking the Review, the Committee must have regard to whether people in regional, rural and remote Australia have equitable access to telecommunications services as compared to services available within urban areas.

The Committee invites individuals, regional community groups, businesses, industry and governments to engage directly with the Review. Relevant local governments have been invited to engage with the Committee in face-to-face consultations in various locations around Australia. Local governments also had the opportunity to participate by providing the Committee with a written submission in response to the 2024 Regional Telecommunication Review Issues Paper.

The 2024 Regional Telecommunications Review concluded in December 2024, when the Committee delivered the final Report of the 2024 Review to the Hon Michelle Rowland MP, former Minister for Communications. On 18 September 2025, the Government Response to the Review was tabled in the Senate (out of session) and later tabled in the House of Representatives on 7 October 2025.

### ***Strengthening Telecommunications Against Natural Disasters (STAND) Program***

**Commencement:** 2020.

**Program Description:**

The STAND Program supported the increase and improvement of telecommunications resilience in regional and remote communities recently affected by severe bushfires or at future risk of bushfires. It aimed to enhance the capability to restore services to areas affected by bushfires or natural disasters by quickly deploying temporary facilities to address gaps caused by outages.

The Program provided NBN Co. with grant funding to install and operate 1,068 Sky Muster satellites (also referred to as 'Disaster Satellite Services') to provide additional telecommunications redundancy at evacuation centres and emergency service depots across the country.

State and territory governments were responsible for nominating suitable locations for the installation of the Disaster Satellite Services. Where relevant, state governments consulted with local governments to select the most appropriate evacuation centres for the satellite services.

**Program Funding:**

A total of \$6.2 million in funding was made available to NBN Co. as a one-off ad-hoc grant opportunity. The Disaster Satellite services are funded by the Australian Government through to 31 December 2025.

***Telecommunications Disaster Resilience Innovation (TDRI) Program***

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

The TDRI Program aims to improve the preparedness of Australia's telecommunications networks against rising climate risks, including against an anticipated increase in the frequency and severity of natural hazards in Australia. The Program encourages the development and deployment of innovative, new or emerging technologies and solutions that will improve resilience and ensure that Australian communities remain connected and can continue to access vital services before, during and after a natural disaster occurs.

Local governments can be involved with the two funding rounds under the TDRI Program by providing in-kind financial contributions and consultation. They are also directly eligible to apply for grant funding under the Program, provided their application was in partnership with a mobile network operator, mobile network infrastructure provider, or NBN Co.

**Program Funding:**

\$50 million in total funding has been made available for the Program, with \$17.4 million awarded for the Power Resilience and Innovation Round in May 2024.

***NBN Fibre Upgrades***

**Commencement:** 2022.

**Program description:**

In 2022 the Australian Government committed \$2.4 billion in funding to NBN Co to upgrade 1.5 million premises within the National Broadband Network (NBN) to a full fibre to the premises connection. These upgrades were completed in December 2025.

In January 2025, a further commitment was announced to finish the fibre to the node upgrades to deliver better internet to the final 622,000 households and businesses. Once the final upgrades are completed by the end of 2030, more than 94% of premises on the fixed line network will have access to connections enabling speeds of up to 1Gbps. These upgrades will allow the transition of premises off the NBN's aging fibre to the node network to full fibre or alternative technologies. The upgrades will deliver more productivity and connectivity, as well as increased network resilience. The final upgrade footprint contains premises which are more complex, and at times are more expensive to upgrade. It is anticipated full fibre will be the best solution for around 95% of these premises. The use of alternative technologies may be deployed for the highest cost premises to provide improved internet services while providing cost savings to the Government's commitment of up to \$3 billion in equity funding.

Further to upgrades to NBN fixed-line premises, over one million premises in regional and remote Australia and in peri-urban areas have been given access to higher speeds on NBN fixed wireless services or greater data limits on Sky Muster services as a result of the Government providing \$480 million towards an upgrade of the NBN fixed wireless network. Under the upgrade, the fixed wireless footprint coverage has been expanded, enabling over 120,000 additional premises to access fixed wireless services instead of Sky Muster satellite services. All premises in the fixed wireless footprint are now able to access download speeds of up to 100 megabits per second (Mbps) and upload speeds of up to 20 Mbps, up from the previous maximum of 75/10 Mbps, with higher speed plans of 200-250 Mbps and 400 Mbps download available to many users.

**Program Funding:**

The 1.5 million premises within the fixed line network to a FTTP connection were funded with a \$2.4 billion commitment from the Government. The 622,000 upgrades are backed by an equity injection of up to \$3 billion from the Government, with a contribution of \$800 million by NBN Co. The Government provided \$480 million towards an upgrade of the NBN fixed wireless network.

## Creative Economy and the Arts Group

### *Festivals Australia Program*

**Commencement:** 1994.

**Program Description:**

The Festivals Australia program supports individual art projects that allow people in regional or remote Australia to participate in arts-driven experiences, helping to connect communities and foster local talent. The program supports partnerships and collaboration across the arts sector and encourages community participation in arts festivals or significant one-off community events in regional or remote Australia. Local governments are eligible to apply.

**Program Funding:**

More than \$1.4 million in funding is made available per year, delivered through two open competitive funding rounds around February and September. In December 2025, \$719,000 in funding was announced, to be shared among 21 projects in regional and remote communities through Round 21 of the program.

### *Indigenous Visual Arts Industry Support (IVAIS) Program*

**Commencement:** 2022.

**Program Description:**

The IVAIS program supports the operation of over 100 organisations, including more than 85 Indigenous art centres, as well as several art fairs, regional hubs and industry service organisations that are at the heart of Australia's world-renowned Indigenous visual art movement. Together these organisations support more than 8,000 artists and over 500 Indigenous arts workers, most in very remote Indigenous communities. In 2024–25, the IVAIS program is supporting six local governments, located in Western Australia and Queensland, to provide services to First Nations visual artists and engage Indigenous arts workers.

**Program Funding:**

Approximately \$30 million in funding is made available each year directly to organisations through a closed, non-competitive and an open competitive grant opportunity.

### *Revive Live Program*

**Commencement:** 2024.

**Program Description:**

The *Revive Live* program is focused on supporting established live music venues and music festivals, with a primary purpose to host original live music and a strong focus on showcasing Australian artists. Organisations must be majority-Australian owned, and can be located anywhere in Australian suburban, regional and remote regions. Local governments are eligible to apply.

**Program Funding:**

The program has so far provided \$18.4 million in grant funding to support 217 live music businesses, including 119 music festival-based activities and 98 live music venues. The Australian Government committed to provide \$25 million over two years from 2025-26 for the program.

### ***Regional Arts Fund***

**Commencement:** 1997.

**Program Description:**

The Regional Arts Fund supports cultural development in regional, remote and rural communities. Regional Arts Australia administers the program nationally on behalf of the Australian Government. The program funds quick response grants and project grants, as well as professional development for artists and arts workers, and community capacity building projects which encourage and support sustainable economic, social and cultural development in regional communities.

**Program Funding:**

More than \$6 million in funding is made available per year through ongoing competitive and strategic grants opportunities. The Australian Government's Cultural Policy *Revive: a place for every story, a story for every place*, provided an ongoing uplift to the Regional Arts Fund of \$8.5 million over four years from 2023-24. Approximately 300 grants are approved each year across all funding streams.

### ***Revive, National Cultural Policy***

**Commencement:** 2023.

**Program Description:**

*Revive* is a 5-year National Cultural Plan to renew and *Revive* Australia's arts, entertainment and cultural sector, structured around five interconnected pillars which set out the Australian Government's strategic objectives:

- **First Nations First:** Recognising and respecting the crucial place of First Nations stories at the centre of Australia's arts and culture.
- **A Place for Every Story:** Reflecting the breadth of our stories and the contribution of all Australians as the creators of culture.
- **Centrality of the Artist:** Supporting the artist as workers and celebrating artists as creators.
- **Strong Cultural Infrastructure:** Providing support across the spectrum of institutions which sustain our arts, culture, and heritage.
- **Engaging the Audience:** Making sure our stories connect with people at home and abroad.

Local government engagement is encouraged through the re-establishment of intergovernmental meetings between Commonwealth and, state and territory cultural ministers and the Australian Local Government Association. These meetings have been operational since June 2022 and are held twice a year.

**Funding:**

Over \$286 million in initial funding, and a further \$755.5 million subsequently committed.
