## **Re: Response to Questions on Notice**

We are writing to elaborate on our evidence of the impact of the energy supplement repeal.

As we noted at the recent hearing, the supplement was introduced at the same time that a standard CPI adjustment arrangement had been due - a 1.6% increase.

Instead, under the energy supplement arrangements, the 'basic' rate of Newstart was increased by 0.9% and the 0.7% put into a new rate component. The balance moved to the clean energy supplement.

In addition, the compensation arrangements also included a real increase (above CPI) of 1%. The clean energy supplement ended up being this 1% real increase, plus the 0.7% part of the normal CPI adjustment, giving a total payment of 1.7% of the original pre-indexation rate.

As a result of all this, removing the energy supplement means the rates of payments for new applicants will actually be less than if compensation for carbon pricing had never been introduced.

As an example, for a person claiming the (usual) lower single Newstart allowance rate, this will mean their payment is not just \$8.80 a fortnight less than current recipients (who get to keep the energy supplement), but \$3.60 less than it would have been had the energy supplement never been introduced.

Below are examples of how the energy supplement removal will impact other payments:

household	approximate

couple Newstart	6.40
sole parent, 2 children (8, 10), Newstart	7.50
couple, 2 children (2, 4), Newstart/parenting payment	10.40
