RE: Human Services Legislation Amendment Bill 2010

The AIHW welcomes the opportunity to make a submission to the Community Affairs Legislative Committee regarding the Human Services Legislation Amendment Bill 2010.

The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) is tasked with providing reliable, regular and relevant information and statistics on Australia's health and welfare. Our aim is to improve the health and wellbeing of Australians through better health and welfare information and statistics. We collect and report information on a wide range of topics and issues, ranging from health and welfare expenditure, hospitals, disease and injury, and mental health, to ageing, homelessness, disability and child protection.

The AIHW is a significant user of the administrative data from Centrelink and Medicare Australia in analysis and reports, and in our role supporting and collaborating with the research community. The AIHW has a set of robust and well-documented privacy and security policies and procedures that govern all of our work.

It is our understanding that the proposed Human Services Legislation Amendment Bill 2010 will place no further restrictions on the use by AIHW of data collected by Centrelink and Medicare Australia, allowing us to continue to use these data in the production of vital information in support of health and welfare analysis and research for informed policymaking and service delivery design. Any legislative amendments should not prejudice this current arrangement which enables effective and proper use of information collected by Centrelink and Medicare Australia.
