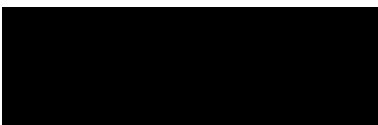
Voters will question why the government is not funding a neutral yes and no case. They will want to know why official yes and no pamphlets are being abolished by this Bill.
