**The Finance and Public Administration Committee Inquiry into Native Vegetation.**

I am a landholder at [ ] I have 2,000 hectares and run sheep and cattle. I have a parcel of land in that 2,000 hectares that is covered with stringy bark, blackbutt and box trees that I cannot remove if needed. I can run sheep and cattle on it, but cannot farm it.

I believe the current system of paying landholders to grow trees is biased and morally wrong. Then again many political parties seem to have a bias against small businesses and farmers. Unfortunately many politicians leave their morals in the lobby when they enter Parliament House. Most landholders who come into the above category are landholders who destroyed the habitat ruthlessly. Now they are rewarded for their incompetence.
