Of course, I cannot prove that I am being discriminated against by any employer because employers will not state so in writing nor say it directly to me.

The amount of money that I receive from Centrelink on a fortnightly basis is **barely** enough for me to pay my rent and buy my food. Once I have paid for these two necessities, I have only a small amount of discretionary money left that I am able to spend as I choose.

I am currently sharing a house in _____, with my landlord and six other people. All of these people are very nice, but they too are struggling to make ends meet, even though they are working.

WHAT I WOULD LIKE TO SEE CHANGED

It would be a great help to people like me who are surviving on Newstart Allowance, to have an increase in the payment of this allowance. This increase would go a little way to address the imbalance that has existed between those in our country who are out of work, and those who are in employment.

I realise that it is up to both the Minister and the Federal Government to legislate for an increase in the rate of Newstart Allowance, but is not the mark of a compassionate and just society how it treats those citizens who are out of work, living on pensions or are homeless. Such an increase would allow people like me to have a standard of living that would give all of us hope for the future. I do want to work; I can assure you of that one hundred percent.

In conclusion, this is an issue that my country must change for the better and soon. If it is not, then we will condemn Australians who are out of work to a life of poverty and misery that is morally wrong.
