Addendum to Submission to the Senate Inquiry into Overseas Military Deployment

In relation to the joint attack by our forces on Iraq in 2003, for any country to use military force to carry out a UN Security Council Resolution lawfully, it must, under Article 43 of the UN Charter, have in place a Special Agreement, which is to be ratified by the signatory state in accordance with constitutional processes. Australia in such a case would be entitled to participate in Security Council meetings about the deployment, if it were not already a member of the Security Council at that time.

I established by inquiry of the federal government that no such agreement existed between Australia and the UN re Iraq in 2003.

In passing, I note that there was also a deployment of Australian troops in connection with Iraq in 1996, which I didn't note in the initial submission, and there has been deployment of Australian military forces in Syria quite recently. There was also a conspicuously positive deployment of our troops to Timor Leste during its transition from Indonesian rule through Interfet and then through Untaet.
