Submission to the Senate Inquiry regarding the Therapeutic Goods Amendment (2016 Measures No. 1) Bill 2016

Research Australia is pleased to have this opportunity to make this submission to the Inquiry.

The Therapeutic Goods Amendment (2016 Measures No. 1) Bill 2016 (the Bill) is an important component of the Government's response to the recommendations of the review of Medicines and Medical Devices Regulation (MMDR). Research Australia urges the Committee to recommend that the Senate pass the Bill.

The aim of the Review's recommendations is to improve the processes for the approval of medicines and medical devices by the Therapeutic Goods Administration. Together the regulatory reforms are expected to reduce the administrative burden on applicants and make the approval process faster without jeopardising the safety of consumers.

Achieving this aim will provide consumers with earlier access to potentially lifesaving new medicines and devices. It is also an effective means of supporting Australia's medical device and medicines industries; by accelerating their pathway to market it will enable them to become profitable more quickly, providing them with more resources to pursue the international markets needed to be truly successful and profitable.

As noted above, the Bill is only one component of the reforms arising from the MMDR, which also include new regulations and changes to the TGA's processes and procedures. Research Australia is confident that the passage of this Bill in its current form will facilitate the other reforms required to fully implement the reforms, but achieving the outcomes is dependent on a thorough and effective consultation process on the regulations and other subsequent changes with all stakeholders.

Research Australia is also conscious that the introduction of new Australian based third party organisations able to approve new medical devices, while welcome, will require a rigorous accreditation process and compliance framework.
