Impacts of Rural Wind Farms Inquiry

This submission is in support of the Clean Energy Councils Submission to the above senate inquiry.

The key "green arguments" ought be well understood, so this submission will not cover those issues that will stand on their own.

We wish to comment briefly on the flow on from having highly trained technical people being based in regional centres to maintain and operate the wind farm infrastructure.

Most small regional communities like Merredin, for example have a dearth of such occupations, and any opportunity to have that position improved is very important to the long-term sustainability of the regions.

Such groups of skilled well paid people by their existence, draw the next level of service providers, further enhancing the potential of the region to attract and hold further investment.
