While I understand the need to reduce spending, I'm disappointed to hear that the Australian Renewable Energy Agency will have its funding cut.

While I do not pretend to know enough of about the particulars of the agency to know how effective it is, I do believe that we need to invest significantly in the renewable energy sector not only for environmental reasons, but for commercial reasons as well. Regardless of our own commitment to coal, it is becoming increasingly clear that there is long term interest in renewables the world over. They are a fantastic opportunity to add liquidity to the energy market, increase employment and generate wealth for individuals and the country.

The specific decision regarding the Australian Renewable Energy Agency will no doubt take many things into account which I cannot evaluate from where I sit, however whatever the decision we must continue to fund research and development of renewable energy technologies, increasing our commitment rather than decreasing it in a bout of short-sighted financial restraint. Needless to say, the environmental benefits are potentially great too - it is not just carbon dioxide, but many other harmful pollutants that fossil fuels generate.
