The main features of the NDIS that will make a difference to the community are:

People with a disability can plan their lives and pursue their goals and dreams, Minimising the number of times people have to tell their story in order to get support, Older parents and families will not worry what happens when they can no longer provide support

The most important services for the NDIS to provide are:

Therapy and allied health services, Flexible in-home/outside home respite, Positive behaviour support and psychological services

I support the introduction of the NDIS.

I must say that limiting the above to 3 choices for a person with severe sensory, intellectual and health disorders was unfair and forced me to leave off very necessary options which are currently met and I hope will continue to get the minimal support that they presently receive.

In answer to this question

I am tired of running a service and doing all the thinking for everyone else because we all walk such a fully stretched tightrope that I cannot afford to let go myself or let any of the support slacken their grip even momentarily.

I used to have a life - I know what I have lost.

My daughter has never known a good life - she deserves to experience what life can offer and share what she has to offer.
