Inquiry into out-of-home care – questions taken on notice

Dear Committee Secretary

Please find below AIHW responses to the questions taken on notice during the hearing held by the Senate Community Affairs References Committee in Canberra on Thursday 16 April 2015.

Question 1: Survey questions (National Survey of the Views of Children and Young People in Care)

Attachment 1 contains the list of core questions included in the National Survey of the Views of Children and Young People in Out-of-Home Care. The AIHW will use the survey data to undertake national reporting against the 8 child-reported measures under the National Standards for Out-of-Home Care in 2015 (also documented in Attachment 1). It is currently expected that data will be released in early December 2015.

The survey questions are provided on an in-confidence basis; the survey is still in the field and the early publication of these questions may affect the integrity of survey responses. Should you wish to distribute the survey questions (that is, Attachment 1) more widely than the committee, please contact us.

Question 2: State/territory surveys of children and young people in care

The AIHW is aware that Western Australia uses the Viewpoint questions (upon which the National Survey questions, see Attachment 1, were largely based) as part of their local case management/care planning process. However, we are not aware of any published results.

Notes

1. Where a child is placed with a relative who is also fully registered to provide foster care for other children, they are counted in the 'foster care' category for Victoria and Western Australia, whereas they are counted in the 'relatives/kin' category in Queensland and South Australia. Relatives/kin in some jurisdictions undergo assessment, registration and review processes similar to foster carers under the national definition, and are considered as (relative) foster carers in local practice, policy and reporting.
2. Percentages include children with 'other/unknown' living arrangements.
3. Percentages in the table may not add to 100 due to rounding.
