The most dangerous aspect of this Bill is that it allows the Government to manipulate the rules at the end of the process, instead of working to get the rules right up front. In doing so, it takes advantage of the vulnerable, and those who followed the rules.

Pathways to permanent residency were shown to us, Hence we opted for cookery or hairdressing courses, If Australia is no more short of cooks or hairdressers, these pathways should be closed so that future migrants don't opt for these courses in case they want to get permanent residency.

But that doesn't means that International migrant like myself and my wife who opted for cookery 3 years ago, finished their studies and met all the prerequisites for applying permanent residency and now are on bridging visa should go back because of backlog of large amount of applications. This is not justice.
