Decades of entrenched inequity and fragmentation of service access and delivery

Speech Pathology Workforce deficits (public and private)

Flow on to Pre-Graduate Clinical Fieldwork Experiences and Opportunities

Tension across Public Departments – Frustration, ownership of issue – Silo approaches

Social Indicators – Lower socio-economic status, low employment opportunity, poorer health and education attainment, higher Indigenous populations

Geography – remote, isolation, access

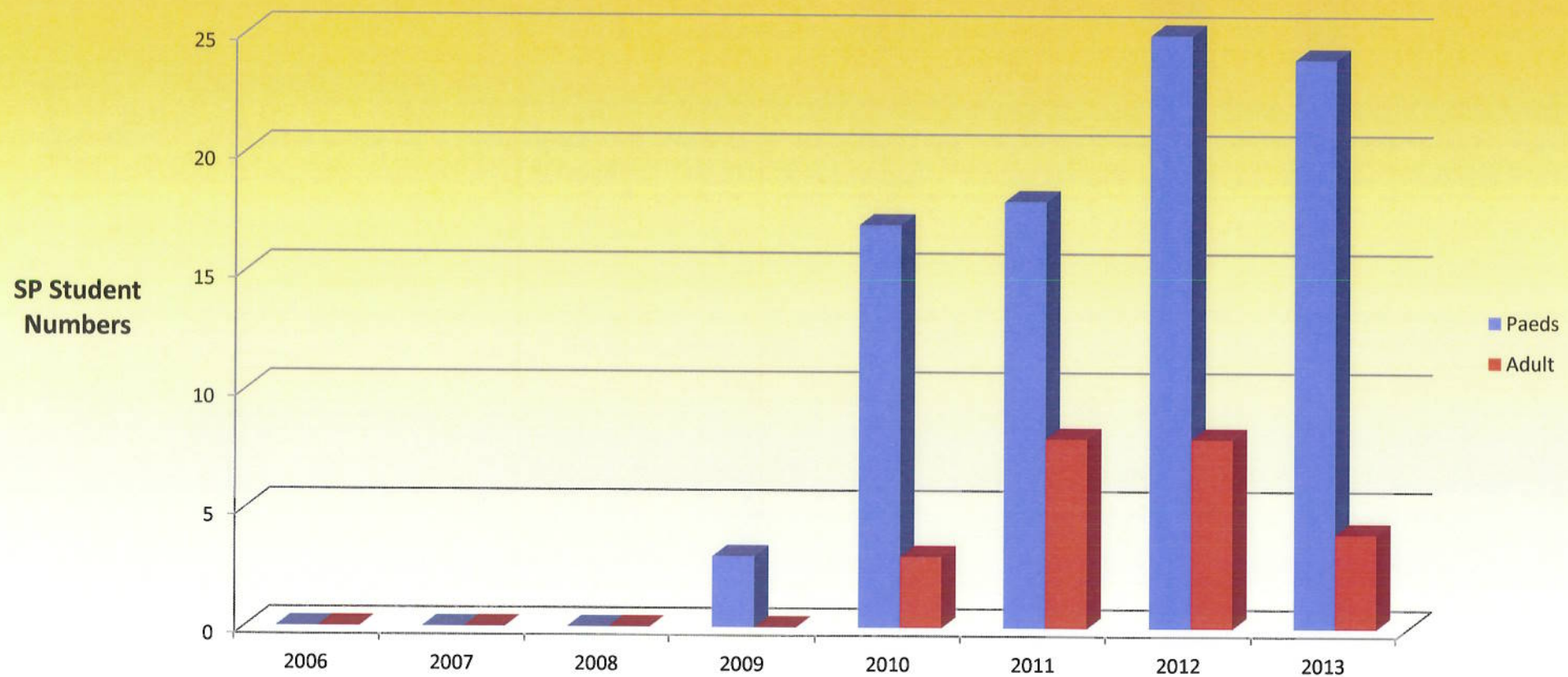

Frequency of Issue		(1 or more)
• Speech	108	Fronting, Cluster reduction
• Language	99	Story telling
• Phonological Awareness	63	Pre literacy skills
Individual Pupil Sessions	80	One on one
Group Sessions	129	Approximately: 4-7 pupils in each session
Class Sessions	47	Approximately: 18-22 pupils in each class session
