Subject: Question on Notice – Senate Enquiry 15 March, Brisbane

Dear Stephen

Find attached RAPAD's responses to the QoN from yesterday senate enquiry.

1. Senator Fisher

10.46am - Please expand on your comment that local governments operators need extra time to conduct trials and cost benefit analyses of digital conversion options in relation to self help broadcasting sites and that this will not delay the digital switchover?

RAPAD councils and all self-help licensees in remote areas of Queensland could be given the time to proof of concept digital self-help terrestrial transmission facilities; carry out subsequent cost benefit analysis; consult further with ratepayers; and decide to go ahead with establishing such a facility or not without affecting any of the indicated analogue switch-off dates for any region. All that would be required is for the remote areas of Queensland to either not be included in the regional Qld SSS contract and deadlines (just as remote SA was separated from regional SA for SSS implementation purposes see below table) or DBCDE could stick to its original closing date for remote Queensland SSS of March 2012 and delay its opening from 20 April to say August 2011 (see table below).

As the remote areas of Queensland are due to switch-off analogue in mid 2013 the above 2 options do not affect the switch-off date for the remote areas of our state. At the same time existing SSS

deadlines could apply to regional Queensland as we understand the Government intends to switchoff analogue in these TV markets by 31 December 2011.

I hope the committee understands that mass letters being sent out to our ratepayers inviting them to opt in to the SSS scheme on 20 April without the councils being able to provide definitive alternate information concerning digital self-help — would just be a recipe for steamrolling our ratepayers' interests.

We note that the above procedure change is not the province of the Bill. For many of our issues we needed to use the Bill and the Senate Committee to communicate on a whole raft of matters. Our submission and that of LGAQ however carefully did include a great many matters that are directly the subject of the Bill, such as our opposition to any opportunities for any broadcaster being able to seek exemptions from any of their current legal obligations to roll out digital terrestrial wherever they operate analogue terrestrial transmitters.

Just as we seek to do all we can to see if we can make digital self-help work in our areas – because we believe digital terrestrial reception may be both cheaper and more convenient to households and businesses than VAST DTH – so we are most opposed to others being able to take advantage of any opportunity to roll out less digital terrestrial facilities than currently their legal obligations would require.

Our own desires to thoroughly investigate digital terrestrial self-help options are directly related to the broadcasters also rolling out a maximum of digital terrestrial facilities of their own.

2. Given the recent extreme weather patterns in QLD, wouldn't it be preferable to upgrade current analogue transmitters to digital rather than having exposed satellite equipment installed at each user's home base?

Bligh Government delivers for rural students

Premier Anna Bligh today announced new travel and board allowances for rural students attending specialised Queensland Academies in South East Queensland.

There are three Academies for gifted students in Years 10 to 12 - the Creative Industries Academy at Kelvin Grove, the Science, Mathematics and Technology Academy at Toowong and the Health Sciences Academy on the Gold Coast.

Ms Bligh said the issue of allowances had been raised previously with her and the Education Minister.

"These are rural students chosen to study at an Academy because they are especially talented and frankly they deserve a better deal.

"I'm pleased to announce that the new allowances

will be in place in time for the 2011 schools year.

"Eligible students will receive up to \$1434 per year for travel and a homestay accommodation allowance of up to \$6926 per year.

"This is great news for these students and will ease the burden on their families.

Education Minister Geoff Wilson said guidelines for the new program, the *Queensland Academies Isolated Student Bursar*, would be published on the Department of Education and Training website this month.

"This allowance will make a big difference to the lives of rural students attending the Academies," Mr Wilson said.

"Some of these students travel many hundreds of kilometres and they deserve some assistance."

Mr Wilson said the extra support meant the Bligh Government could reaffirm its resolve to provide every Queensland student a flying start to learning and life.

"Students, no matter their circumstance or where they live, should be able to have access to a high quality education in 21st Century facilities," he said.

"Moreover, rural students who are gifted in certain areas should be able to attend a school like the Academies and the Bligh Government is pleased to help them do just that."

Mayor's Annual Report 09/10

It is with pleasure that I submit my report as mayor on behalf of Barcoo Shire for the 2009 / 2010 financial year.

To say the year has just slipped by would be an understatement. As a local authority we seem to be more involved than ever in issues of major social, economic and environmental importance to Barcoo Shire and Central West Region. I cannot remember a time in my involvement in local government when we have been, either motivated to, asked or required to comment and respond to proposed changes in state and national policy and law. While at the same time having had to be mindful of making sure that our core council responsibilities are carried out and our communities and residents are cared for.

I would like to thank Barcoo Shire CEO Mr Michael Parker and the great council staff for their untiring dedication to making this shire a better place to live and raise a family. There has been an enormous workload this year and many major projects completed or well on their way to completion. The workforce have stepped up to the plate and attended to their responsibilities and the job at hand with very professional skills and wonderful mindset.

Fellow councillors, thank you for your support and wise counsel. You all have a great sense of community while at the same time understand the importance of good governance, sound decision making and responsible fiscal management. With these attributes, your constituents should have the confidence that their council is working hard for them and the betterment of the shire and region.

The bitumen sealing programs on the Yaraka, Bedourie and Birdsville roads are continuing well through a number of local, state and national government funding initiatives. Across the region we have secured a commitment from the state government through the ORRG (Outback Regional Roads Group) of \$70million over 5 years for priority regional roads in the Central West. The continuation of the national Roads to Recovery Program and the states commitment to seal from Windorah to Jericho via Yaraka in lieu of the discontinuation of the Jericho to Yaraka rail service has given the shire a scope of works to assure our road network is always on the improve and the shire maintains financial viability.

On top of the bitumen sealing program our workforce and subcontractors have completed numerous improvements to grids, floodway and drainage structures as-well-as many kilometres of gravel resheeting.

The shire has also suffered some substantial road and drainage damage from the recent heavy rain events and subsequent flooding. The council workforce is busy making these roads trafficable and safe for residents, visitors and our local agriculture, mining, gas and oil industries.

On the 25th, 26th and 27th of



June Barcoo Shire had the pleasure of hosting Their Excellencies the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia Ms Quentin Bryce AC and Mr Michael Bryce AM AE. Their Excellencies officially attended to the opening of our three new public buildings in our communities, the Stonehenge Community Centre, Barcoo Shire Administration Building in Jundah and the Windorah Community Centre. These civic receptions and official openings were well attended by locals, visitors and special guests, with Their Excellencies and attending staff enjoying some great outback hospitality.

The condition and appearance of our 3 communities has become a priority of council since completing the sealing of the Windorah to Longreach road. As a council we are committed to making our communities attractive and nice places to live and visit. Through this year past and over the next few years the council is planning to finish the curb and channelling and wide-seal of the streets to minimise dust and add to the general ease of maintenance. We are increasingly receiving very positive comments about

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the beauty and cleanliness of the towns and it is a credit to all involved in their inviting condition.

As a council we continue to increase our involvement in regional co-operation through our membership of the RA-PAD Board (Remote Area Planning and Development Board) and the ORRG (Outback Regional Roads Group). These organisations are delivering many regional outcomes for the Central West of Queensland region. I have seen many benefits in moving to deal with issues that affect more than just our shire through these forums. It makes it much easier for both state and federal governments to address a problem through a collective of councils rather than on an individual basis. We have seen the fruits of this work through extra road funding, the management of federal programs such as the Rural Financial Counselling Service, co-operative public transport outcomes, better consultative processes on new legislation and the delivering of training in hospitality, information and technology and

Barcoo Shire is also working closely with its near neighbour to the west Diamantina Shire, on a number of important issues and cost saving initiatives that relate more to our collective shire's remoteness. These include the sharing of some key staff, joint purchasing of select items of plant and the delivering of training in certain areas. We are also working together on the delivery of better on-line commu-

nications for our communities through a joint offer to the Australian Government of \$2.8millon to extend optic fibre telecommunications backhaul infrastructure to our shire's respective towns. We believe we are at great risk of being left out of the NBN (National Broadband Network) if we do not get this issue front and centre before both state and federal communications ministers and hopefully negotiate a joint co-funding agreement between the 3 levels of government to digitally enable our communities for the 21st century.

The Central West Regional Plan was released in September 2009 after a lengthy consultation process. My involvement as co-chair of the Central West Regional Planning Committee gave me a good insight into the planning process and this document will be a very useful planning document so we get consistency in ours and the states vision for the region.

This year's end sees council in a strong financial position. I believe this is a result of careful planning and financial reporting by the administration and responsible economic and fiscal decisions by elected members. We continue to fund the depreciation of the shire's assets, and have ample reserves for contingent liabilities, employee's provisions and entitlements. We have adopted a 10 year planning process for capital works and plant, which enables council to see the effects of a proposal, in the cost of depreciation, cash flow and cash reserves. We are constantly reviewing ourselves

against the QTC (Queensland Treasury Corporation) ratios and cash-flow forecast to maintain the appropriate financial buffer to enable council to absorb an unplanned financial shock.

The next 12 months will be as busy as ever as we continue to deal with a new Local Government Act and the new requirements that come with its implementation. We will conduct a review of Local Laws and Council Policies, deal with implementation a new Water Resource Plan for Cooper's Creek, assess the effects of the Wild Rivers declaration of the Channel Country Rivers, continue to promote the importance of the NBN to our communities, make sure our residents are ready for the digital switch-over of television services, plus all of our core business activities.

In general I am very pleased with the Barcoo Shire's performance on behalf of its communities. We are returning profits to our shareholders through better and more liveable communities, up grading our road networks and keeping touch with any threats to our environment or way-of-life, while being mindful of economic and social opportunities.

I am aware that we seem to do the big stuff reasonably well and get some very positive comment for our efforts. But as with any organisation there is always room to improve. I think we need to concentrate over the next couple of years on getting the little things working better. In saying this I would like us to put more emphases on the finer detail. We need to minimise waste, both time and

Digital Television Service

Dear Residents of Barcoo Shire,

As you would be hearing in the media, Australian television and radio broadcast providers are required to convert all of their current analogue transmitters to full digital transmission by 2013.

This will happen progressively state-by-state from now until the 2013 deadline, and is referred to in the media, and by the Australian Government, the Minister responsible for this portfolio, Senator Stephen Conroy, his department, the Department of Broadband, Communications and the Digital Economy (DBCDE) and their agencies, such as the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) and the Digital Switch-Over Taskforce as the 'digital switch -over'.

It is expected that most of Queensland will become digital compliant by the end of 2011.

In all larger population areas such as the capital and regional cities and major regional towns the only requirement for residents to receive a full digital television or radio service is to purchase either a digital ready television and radio or purchase a set-top-box to allow an analogue television to receive digital programming and possibly a new or repositioned antenna.

However in approximately 104 smaller communities throughout Queensland with populations of less than 500 residents

or are in a remote location, who are currently receiving their television service from a community or council owned self-help rebroadcast site, the digital switch-over and future arrangements for your television reception will be entirely different.

The Australian Government have said, that in the 104 communities who currently have a self-help rebroadcast television service, that it is too expensive for the government to subsidise broadcasters to supply equipment to convert to a full digital transmitter. The Digital Switch-Over Task Force says a conversion of this type will be in the vicinity of \$250,000. The government's solution to this will be to subsidise a direct -to-home (DTH) satellite television installation for private residents through a Satellite Subsidy Scheme (SSS).

The digital television programming will be delivered over the new free-to-air 'Viewer Access Satellite Television' (VAST) platform. The VAST service was developed and owned by Eastern Australian Satellite Broadcasting (EASB) a subsidiary of Macquarie Southern Cross Media and Imparia Television, and funded to the tune of \$400million by the Australian Government. The VAST free-to-air service will be delivered from the Optus C1 satellite which is the same as the current Aurora free-to-air and Austar PayTV. This also means that much of the current equipment installed on many homes and homesteads, is

compatible with the VAST free -to-air satellite television platform.

The impact of this policy decision is that there would be no longer a terrestrial television signal in the communities of Barcoo Shire and many other similar small towns. At face value it might seem that this is a reasonable solution. But we have identified a number of potential issues for these towns and communities in changing to a DTH satellite television solution and removing the terrestrial service that seem very unfair compared to our cousins in bigger centres.

Council is keen to make sure the residents of Barcoo Shire are as fully informed as possible of all the benefits and issues as we see them, as we move toward the digital switch -over by the end of 2011. The council also wants to make sure that residents not only understand the known problems and possible solutions through this change of technology, but you will also understand the reasons why council will have to make certain decisions on your behalf. And furthermore we would like to hear your feedback on the information provided.

In December the Australian Government has announced a request for tenders (RFT) for the supply and installation of satellite television equipment for each residence of the 104 communities in Queensland who are to receive a DTH television service. In February

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contracts are negotiated from the RFTs to provide DTH installations in the communities, and in April applications are open for the SSS. For Barcoo Shire's residents the SSS will provide \$550.00 toward the cost of the equipment and installation for DTH satellite reception.

- I have listed below the points I feel you need to know about converting your community and home to a DTH satellite television service.
- The Satellite Subsidy Scheme will not cover the full cost of the DTH television installation. The SSS contributions from the Australian Government of \$550.00 will, we believe, leave a balance of somewhere in between \$0 to \$200.00 to be paid for by the house occupier.
- The Satellite Subsidy Scheme will not be available for commercial businesses to convert to DTH television; i.e. accommodation outlets, pubs and clubs will have to fund their own conversion.
- The Satellite Subsidy Scheme will not be available for Government service providers to convert to DTH television, i.e. health clinics, schools, libraries, information centres.
- The Satellite Subsidy Scheme will not be available for remote locations such as homesteads and mining

sites to convert to the VAST service.

- If your dwelling has more than 1 television, you will need a satellite decoder installed for every television in the household as there is no RF Out connection on the UEC digital satellite decoders.
- There will be an opportunity for private residents, local businesses and service providers to negotiate with the appointed installer to do extra or non-subsidised installations while they are in the area saving costs on travel and bulk purchases prices of equipment.
- With DTH satellite television replacing a rebroadcast analogue terrestrial service, there will be no television signal available for visitors i.e. tourists and transient workers, to caravan parks or backyards.
- You will need a 'digital ready' television set to receive a DTH television service.
- The satellite reception equipment belongs to the occupier of the residence, so any faults or breakdowns and repairs become the responsibility of the consumer.
- As the satellite reception equipment belongs to the occupier of the residence they are quite within their rights to remove the equipment if they sell or move from rental accommodation leaving the new owner /

occupier without a television service.

• The SSS is a one-off government subsidy — so any new residences built, or new owner / occupier taking residence will have to fully fund their DTH satellite television equipment.

There is no doubt that 17 digital channels delivered the new VAST free-to-air satellite platform is a wonderful and exciting improvement to the current 4 channels received on the Aurora free-to-air satellite television service.

Barcoo Shire along with other local governments in the central west through the Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD) and the Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ) has been trying since last February to convince the Australian Government and Senator Conroy that there is possibly a better way of delivering the digital switch-over of television services in selfhelp situations.

We have asked the government for the option to allow the councils in the RAPAD region to pool the SSS, to enable us to explore a council managed digital switchover, via either DTH or terrestrial rebroadcast. Where the shire provided, owned and assumed the risk of the satellite equipment in the towns. This would alleviate the risk to the community of equipment breakdowns and reception equipment leaving with the last resident / occupier, or the upgrade and

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ongoing maintenance of a selfhelp facility.

RAPAD and LGAQ have had negotiations with a commercial satellite rebroadcast equipment supplier who say they can rebroadcast the free-to-air digital VAST service for a fraction of the \$250.000 cost that the Digital Switch-Over Taskforce have quoted. We have asked DBCDE to help facilitate a trial of this rebroadcast by obtaining / approving access to Conditional Access Modules (CAMs) from Optus and VAST access cards but there seems to be unwillingness on their part to help us explore this option.

Even if the rebroadcast trial was successful, there is some doubt whether the ACMA would allow the councils in the RAPAD region to utilise the 700MHz or UHF band broadcast spectrum we currently use for rebroadcast of self-help television. The government proposes to auction 126 MHz of this spectrum under the Digital Dividend for future wireless technologies.

The 104 self-help communities in Queensland are at the point of having to make some decisions about their television reception future. We are aware, but not formally notified by DBCDE as yet, that we have to choose whether council, on behalf of its

resident's wishers to opt-in or opt-out of the SSS by 1st March 2011

As I see it, and after exhausting negotiations with DBCDE, it appears we have no option than to opt-in to the SSS on your behalf. I believe we have nothing to lose by choosing to opt-in to the SSS, and it gives us some time to explore a terrestrial rebroadcast solution while at the same time preserving your access to the SSS if the low cost rebroadcast trial does not prove to be successful.

BULLYING

Children & young people can be the victims of bullying at any age, with the most common being 10-14 year olds. Conflict between children & young people are part of growing up & are to be expected but bullying is a deliberate action that causes physical &/or emotional harm to another.

The 3 main elements of bullying are

- A deliberate intent to harm;
- A power imbalance between the bully & the victim, and

It is a repeated behaviour.

Boys tend to be more physical when they bully while girls mostly bully in a non violent form including silent exclusion, sarcasm, starting rumours, facial expressions & rude remarks about a person's clothing, hair or style.

Cyber bullying is a growing problem that uses the internet to insult, threaten or harm someone with the chance to remain anonymous on line & can occur in the isolation of one's own house or room.

Whatever the type, a young person needs some strategies to help them lessen the impact the bully is having on the victim. Adults need to help teens develop good relationships with good advice & leading by example – let the young person know it is NOT their fault. Teachers, health centre staff, counsellors & the police are all people you can ask for help. Public Meetings to discuss Television Services

The Barcoo Shire Council will hold a meeting in each of the 3 communities to discuss Television Services in Barcoo Shire and the possible impacts to this service with the upcoming switchover of broadcasting in Australia from the current analogue programming to a full digital service.

The current Australian Government policy to manage the digital switch-over will have financial, social and technical impacts on the residents, commercial businesses and service providers in the towns of Stonehenge, Jundah & Windorah.

This is also a meeting for rural residents who are unaware of what is required to become digital compliant. As there is no subsidy being offered by Government for rural residents who currently receive a direct-to-home satellite service - there will be extra expenses for new digital equipment and technical issues to encounter to the way in which you receive your digital television service.

Mayor of Barcoo Shire Cr Bruce Scott will be briefing the community in all three towns on the possible impacts, choices and changes for digital television reception.
