



I have just been informed by the Herald that Senator Wade has categorically denied that these drugs were ever sold in Australia. It is disturbing to find that the Federal Health Department, which is responsible for safeguarding the health of the people of Australia, has not yet caught up with the names of lethal drugs which were sold here in 1961.

It is difficult to decide whether the Minister is careless, indifferent or just ill-informed, but the malformation and death of, as yet, unborn children of Australia, is not a matter about which any Federal Minister for Health should be either indifferent - or careless.

THESE DRUGS WILL STILL BE ON THE SHELVES OF MEDICINE CABINETS IN

MANY HOMES, and I look to you to press Senator Wade to issue to the public a truthful and detailed warning, such as the enclosed, on "Tensival," "Valgis" and "Valgraine."

Should he refuse to do so I ask that you, as Leader of the Opposition, give this statement to the Press.

IT IS A MATTER OF EXTREME URGENCY THAT THE WOMEN OF AUSTRALIA SHOULD BE WARNED, IMMEDIATELY, OF THE DANGEROUS CHARACTER OF THESE DRUGS.

Once again I must thank you for the concern you have shown for those who are threatened by this horror.

Dear Mr. Cairns.

I refer again to your letter of the 13th December, 1962, concerning preparations containing the drug thalidomide.

"Tensival", "Valgis", and "Valgraine" contain thalidomide, but along with "Distaval", they were withdrawn from sale by the manufacturers in November, 1961. Whilst on the market in Victoria, all the above preparations were available only on a doctor's prescription.

In view of the time that has elapsed since thalidomide preparations were withdrawn from sale, and bearing in mind the wide publicity that followed disclosure of the effects of thalidomide when taken by women during early pregnancy, I feel that further warnings are not necessary.



Dear Mr. Calwell,

I refer again to your representations of the 4th December and your further representations of the 18th December, on behalf of Miss Rennie Simmons of Bradley Lodge, 7 Miphin Grove, Hawthorn, concerning the side effects of the drug thelidomide.

I have read Miss Simmons' letter and publication with a great deal of interest. However, I hasten to add that whilst I, too, am dismayed at the tragic effects of the taking of thalidomide by women in early pregnancy, I believe that the Commonwealth has not been at all negligent in this matter.


In our system of parliamentary government, the States have certain sovereign rights, including control over the manufacture and sale of drugs within the individual States. In saying this, I am merely stating the constitutional position. I would not want you to construe this as an attempt to shed any rightful responsibility devolving on the Commonwealth. Yet so far as the Commonwealth is concerned, I feel I must refute Miss Simmons' charges that imply that the Commonwealth has been remiss in its actions associated with the thalidowide tragedy.


Control over the sale of drugs is essentially a matter for the States. It is true that the Commonwealth does have some responsibilities - such as the sale of drugs in the A.C.T. and the N.T. In these territories action was taken to prehibit the sale of thalidomide.


In regard to the sale of drugs containing thalidemide in the States, I wrote to all the State Ministers for Health urging that sales of preparations containing thalidemide be prohibited. In pursuing this action, I could almost be accused of interfering with the sovereign rights of the States, but for the common good I deemed this the right course.

For your information, thalidomide preparations were available in Victoria only when prescribed by a medical practitioner. The Commonwealth is responsible for the supply of pharmaceutical benefits under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme. As you are aware, however, no drugs containing thalidomide have ever been available as pharmaceutical benefits. The other main responsibility of the Commonwealth - in regard to imported drugs - was acknowledged when the Minister for Gustems and Excise took action to prohibit the importation of thalidomide. I trust this letter clarifies for Siss Sismons the position of the Commonwealth in regard to the sale of drugs, and the fact that the Commonwealth took all reasonable action when the side effects of thalidomide became known. Dear Sir.

First of all I wish to thank you very much for the prompt action you have taken in bringing "Warning to Women" to the notice of the Federal Minister for Health.

I must, however, draw your attention to the wholly unsatisfactory and thoroughly misleading nature of Senator Wade's "warning" as published in the Herald (Dec. 10).

'Thalidomide' is merely the chemical name of the drug which has left a trail of horror and suffering throughout the world, and it is utterly useless for the Minister to tell the public that "any supplies of the dangerous drug thalidomide found in household medicine cupboards should be destroyed immediately." THIS DRUG HAS NEVER, AT ANY TIME, IN ANY COUNTRY IN THE WORLD, BEEN SOLD UNDER THE NAME OF 'THALIDOMIDE. '

The documentary, "Warning to Women," discloses full particulars of four patent medicines, all of which contain thalidomide in such quantities that, if taken in accordance with the manufacturers' instructions, they will cause malformed and still-born babies as readily as "Distaval." (the name under which thalidomide is known in Australia).

THREE OF THESE COMPOUNDS, "TENSIVAL," "VALGIS" and "VALGRAINE" HAVE BEEN SOLD IN AUSTRALIA FOR COMPLAINTS SUCH AS HEADACHE, TOOTHACHE, HAYFEVER, NEURALGIA, BRONCHITIS, MIGRAINE, FIBROSITIS, ASTHMA etc.,

In confirmation of the above statement I am enclosing a cutting taken from Truth, (Nov. 24.) which reports an interview with the Distillers Co. (Biochemicals) Aust. Pty Ltd., the manufacturers of the drugs.

As you will see, on receiving a copy of "Warning to Women" Truth questioned the manufacturers who admitted that "Tensival," "Valgis" and "Valgraine" had been sold over the counter without prescription in Australia.




As confirmation of this statement, here is a letter which appeared in the "Lancet" (March 17, 1962). It was written by Mr. Frank Stabler, F.R.C.S., of Newcastle upon Tyne:

"A recent patient of mine showed how small a dose of thalidomide is sufficient to cause the typical deformities... she was given 50 mg. a day for a fortnight. The patient states that she took the tablets for a week only... The baby, weighing 2½ lb. showed phocomelia and died at 33 hours."

(Mr. Stabler's patient took, in all, 350 mg, thalidomide. Dr. A. W. Ferguson's patient took 400 mg. of this drug.)

















Record of Discussion

This morning the Minister for Health, Dr. D.N. Everingham, received at Parliament House Mr. J.W. Draper, the Resident Representative in Australia of the Distillers Company Limited. Mr. Draper was accompanied by Mr. Culey of Allan Allen & Hemsley, Solicitors; the Minister was attended by Sir William Refshauge, Dr. A.S. Spears and Mr. R.J. Findlay of the Department of Health, and by Mr. C. Morrison of the Crown Solicitor's Office.

Mr. Draper stated that he asked for the meeting in order that the Commonwealth Government might be informed in general terms of his company's intention to establish, if it was found practicable a fund to provide assistance throughout their lives for the thalidomide victims. He stated - and he asked that the information be kept confidential - that Distillers had in mind setting aside \$4M. or approximately \$100,000 per child on average.


Mr. Draper said that the establishment of the fund would depend upon all or nearly all of the known victims renouncing any existing or future claims for compensation. There were approximately 9 cases at present before the courts in the various States and others could be expected. He mentioned two other matters giving him concern, firstly, the lengthy period during which claims could be instituted (in some States at least the statutory period of six years for the institution of legal action commences to run, where a minor is concerned, from the time the minor reaches 21 years of age) and, secondly, the company could not be certain that all the potential claimants were known to it. In the U.K. for a number of years the total number of victims was thought to be 65 but after considerable publicity had been given to the affair another 345 sufferers were progressively identified over some years.


Mr. Draper hoped that the company could look to the Commonwealth for endorsement of its proposal and for a measure of direct assistance, e.g., choice of trustees, special taxation consideration, publicity, and help with jurisdictional problems. He did not know, however, to which Minister his representations should be directed.

The Minister said that he could not enter into a commitment of any kind but that, in the first place at least, he would be please to receive on behalf of the Government any representations to it by Distillers.

Mr. Draper stated that he would write to the Minister for Health advising him in formal terms of Distiller's intention to establish a trust and identifying the areas in which the company wished to have the guidance or co-operation of the Commonwealth. He would also inform the State Governments of what Distillers had in mind.



COMPENSATION FOR THALIDOMIDE VICTIMS.

PLEASE PASS FOLLOWING TO TREASURER'S OFFICE.

ON 1 SEPTEMBER WE SPOKE WITH HERR KOCH OF THE LASTENAUSGLEICHS-BANK, WHICH HOLDS FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR PAYMENT OF COMPENSATION. HE PROVIDED THE FOLLOWING ANSWERS TO THE QUESTIONS RAISED IN 0. CH401901:

(I) YES. DM100 MILLION IN THE FORM OF TWO INSTALMENTS OF DM50 MILLION BY THE FIRM GRUENTHAL CHEMIE, THE GERMAN MANUFACTURERS OF THE DRUG.

(II) AND (III) THIS PAYMENT WAS INITIALLY PAID TO A TRUST CONSISTING OF 3 LAWYERS (THE COMPANY LAWYER OF THE FIRM GRUENTHAL CHEMIE, THE LAWYER WHO REPRESENTED THE FIRM AT THE COURT HEARING, AND THE LAWYER REPRESENTING THE CHILDREN). THIS PRELIMINARY TRUST WAS DISSOLVED AND IN 1972 THE FOUNDATION FOR HANDICAPPED CHILDREN WAS FORMED BY ACT OF PARLIAMENT. THIS FOUNDATION WILL REMAIN IN EXISTENCE AS LONG AS THERE ARE THALIDOMIDE VICTIMS LIVING.

(IV) THE FUNDS ARE EXEMPT FROM TAXATION. PAYMENTS ARE MADE IN THE FOLLOWING FORMS:

(A) AN INITIAL LUMP SUM CAPITAL COMPENSATION TO THE PARENTS TO COMPENSATE FOR HARDSHIP SUFFERED AS A RESULT OF THE DRUG:

SUBSEQUENT MINOR LUMP SUM PAYMENTS TO THOSE PARENTS WHOSE CHILDREN ARE NOT SEVERELY HANDICAPPED AS A RESULT OF THALIDOMIDE. THE GOVERNMENT ESTABLISHED A POINTS SYSTEM FOR THE DEGREE OF IMPAIRMENT AND FROM THAT DREW UP A TABLE OF COMPENSATION:



- (2) LUMP SUM IS PAID BIANNUALLY INTO BANK ACCOUNT HELD BY ASSOCIATION FOR THALID OMIDE CHILDREN AND THEN DISTRIBUTED BY ASSOCIATION TO CHILDREN'S INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS. ASSOCIATION DOES NOT ADMINISTER TRUST, BUT MERELY ACTS IN ADVISORY CAPACITY CONCERNING INDIVIDUAL ALLOTMENTS. COMPENSATION CAN THEREFORE BE CONSIDERED AS PAYMENT DIRECTLY TO CHILDREN.




