Topic: Questions on DFAT's Workforce

Question

- What number and percentage of your department/agency's workforce are labour hire?
- What number and percentage of your department/agency's workforce are contractors?
- Which companies does your department/agency have contracts with for the procurement of labour hire and/or contract employees, and what is the value of those contracts?
- The extent to which labour hire and contractors are for seasonal or temporary work and how this changes over the course of a year?
- What guidelines are in place covering the procurement of these labour hire services?
- What guidelines are in place covering the procurement of these contractor services?
- What consultants or other recruitment services are used to procure these workers, the cost of these services and the companies providing them?
- Provide a breakdown of the number of labour hire workers and contractors engaged in each state and territory.

Answer

- 1. The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) does not track 'labour hire' as a workforce category. DFAT categorises its 'external workforce' as contractors, consultants or outsourced service providers, which includes expertise provided under labour hire arrangements.
- 2. As at 30 June 2021, there were approximately 381 (headcount) Australian-based contractors engaged in the provision of services by DFAT. This equates to approximately 10 per cent of the total DFAT Australian-based workforce (30 June 2021).
- 3. Details of contracts entered into and valued at \$10,000 or more, including the total value, description, contract term and any increases in contract value, are publicly available on the AusTender website at www.tenders.gov.au.
- 4. None of DFAT's contractors (381 headcount) are being utilised for seasonal work.
- 5. The department enters into contracts to engage individuals to provide labour, including the appointment of eminent individuals to a special role, or the appointment of a person to a governance committee or for a particular project or deliverable requiring expertise. Decisions to engage these services are made in accordance with the Commonwealth Procurement Rules.

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- 6. The department maintains a temporary register of people interested in working for the department on a non-ongoing basis. When not suitable, contractors are sourced through a recruitment provider/standing offer panels under DFAT's procurement policy framework. Decisions to engage a recruitment provider are made in accordance with *Public Governance*, *Performance and Accountability Act 2013* (PGPA Act 2103) and related rules, including the Commonwealth Procurement Rules.
- 7. The department enters into consultancies through panel arrangements or by making an approach to market when required for specialist expertise. Decisions to engage consultants are made in accordance with the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013* (PGPA Act 2103) and related rules, including the Commonwealth Procurement Rules and departmental policies. These contracts and their value are published on AusTender.
- 8. The number of contractors engaged in each state and territory as at 30 June 2021 was:
