Public hearing to discuss High Risk Terrorist Offenders

Parliament's Intelligence and Security Committee will hold a public hearing on Friday for its review of the Criminal Code Amendment (High Risk Terrorist Offenders) Bill 2016.

The bill establishes a scheme for the continuing detention of high risk terrorist offenders at the conclusion of their custodial sentence. Under the bill, the Attorney-General could apply to the Supreme Court of a State or Territory for a continuing detention order, which, if made, would commit the terrorist offender to be detained for up to three additional years.

The Chair of the Committee, Mr Michael Sukkar MP, said 'the Committee will closely examine the Bill to ensure that it adequately protects the community from terrorist offenders, while protecting individual rights and the rule of law'.
