I have recently been informed of the plight of a very dear friend of mine in regards to proposed legislation amending Australia's General Skilled Migration program. It is my understanding that the Minister of Immigration is suggesting that a vast majority of GSM applications be capped and ceased, even when the affected applicant is currently residing in Australia.

The idea that legitimate applicants; who have lived here for years, followed all the required processes, filed all the appropriate paperwork and spent a great deal of their time and money on doing the right thing; may be given notice that all their efforts have gone to waste and they must leave the country almost immediately – well, this seems absolutely absurd to me! I am an incredibly proud Australian, and a massive part of what makes us who we are is the immense cultural diversity and the widespread acceptance of differences.
