**Senate Economics References Committee - Inquiry into Corporate Tax Avoidance -
KPMG Response to Question on Notice**

KPMG is pleased to provide the following response to the question received on notice from The Honourable Senator Milne on 9 April 2015.

The Honourable Senator Milne asked, "The ATO has a clear list of secrecy jurisdictions. How many of those secrecy jurisdictions does KPMG work in or have offices in? Could you take that on notice, please?"

In response to the question from The Honourable Senator Milne, we have listed below all countries in which KPMG has member firms. KPMG is a global network of separate and independent professional firms providing Audit, Tax and Advisory services. KPMG member firms can be found in 155 countries and there are more than 162,000 people working in member firms around the world.

Member firms of KPMG are established in particular locations where there is a demand for a wide range of business services. Consideration is given to both current and projected future need for a variety of service offerings. The decision made to locate a KPMG member firm in a particular jurisdiction is not based on a corporate tax rate.

There are some countries that have become significant commercial centres as a result of a combination of commercial law simplicity, a threshold level of activity in a particular area and in some instances, low tax rates. This includes self-insurance, hedge and mutual fund activity and portfolio management services. A network member firm of KPMG will provide services in such a market. Such services include financial accounting, auditing, tax and other business and advisory assistance for clients located in those markets.

KPMG has offices in 155 different 'countries'. The concept of 'countries' used here is a broad one and extends beyond the 193 United Nation Member Countries. It includes 'states' where there is a separate set of tax laws. Thus the Cook Islands is not a separate country, but part of New Zealand based on United Nations member country status.

The latest list of 'tax havens' identified by the ATO and available on the internet dates from 2008 and contains 32 countries.¹ This data also refers to an OECD list from an earlier date. Since that time the ATO and Treasury have taken significant action in entering into Tax Information Exchange Agreements (TIEAs). Of the 32 countries on the list of tax havens in 2008, TIEAs have been entered with all but five countries. They are Cyprus, Nauru, Niue, Panama & Seychelles.²

KPMG supports the ATO and Treasury in their efforts to expand the network of countries with which Australia has a Tax Information Exchange Agreement.

The OECD-G20 Action Plan on Base Erosion and Profit Shifting is not focused on "tax havens"; it is focused on circumstances where there is a mismatch between the business activity or value creation and the location where the profits are recognised. This involves consideration of many aspects of our tax law as evidenced in the 15 action items in the OECD Action Plan. KPMG supports the OECD-G20 process in dealing with Base Erosion and Profit Shifting.

KPMG looks forward to the Committee's report and recommendations arising from the Inquiry.
