## Interactive Gambling Amendment Bill 2016 [Provisions] Submission 21

Hi!

I'm an Australian recreational poker player. I currently play online and live (Poker Stars, Crown Casino and some pub venues).

I'm an ex-gambling addict. For years gambling was a serious addiction/problem for me. Ultimately for a couple of years my wife had to manage my finances for me, hold on to my bank cards, my bank passwords, etc.

Online poker actually assisted me in over-coming my addiction. Not only because it is a game of skill and with enough dedication one can eventually consistently win over the long term. But also because I feel it has a very low addiction potential. Unlike the pokies machines, that I struggled with, with poker it's a lot easier to manage an affordable bankroll and the games can last for a long time. Meaning that even as a recreational "losing" player, it's easy to get good value for money (entertainment).

I honestly used online poker to transition from a problem gambler (pokies), to a recreational poker player who sometimes makes a bit of money and is never in a situation we're I've spent more than I can afford on the hobby.

I wholeheartedly support banning online casino games. Heck – I support banning LIVE casino games / pokies. I find them despicable and vulture-like. If I join an online Poker Room that offers casino games on the side – I self-exclude from the casino games.

So I'm not saying we don't need to do something about gambling in general – we do! I think it's an awful, destructive force in our communities. I personally experienced what I can only describe as 'devastation' in my life, as a direct result of gambling, for years.

I actually fear that if online poker becomes prohibited, then I may ultimately succumb to my old habits again. Which would absolutely shatter my world.
