The Climate Change (National Framework for Adaptation and Mitigation) Bill 2020 and Climate Change (National Framework for Adaptation and Mitigation) (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2020

I am concerned and educated citizen that understands the science of climate change and the consequences of inadequate action to reduce carbon and other greenhouse gas emissions. The Australian Government Net Zero by 2050 legislation should include regular 5 yearly reviews of outcomes and budgets. Implementation should be overseen by an independent Climate Change Commission that reports openly on actions taken and outcomes.

As the most recent report from the Bureau of Meteorology and CSIRO (13 Nov 2020) highlights, Australia is already feeling the impact of climate change. It is therefore important that we also identify the risks to our country for built, natural and social assets and determine a roadmap of actions to address climate adaption and resilience.

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
