To whom it may concerns,

Mass killing of people who are peacefully protesting especially women and girls

The brutal murder of Mahsa Amini by the so-called "morality police" in Tehran over a month ago, sparked the mass protests - which quickly evolved into a Revolution - against the Islamic Republic Regime, led by young Iranian women and schoolgirls seeking an end to their oppression. This Resolution has seen Iranian and non-Iranians around the world marching in solidarity with Iranian people fighting for their basic Human Rights, standing in the face of oppression.

The response of the Regime to the protests has been horrific, leading to more arrests, tortures, and deaths of hundreds of more innocent lives, including children/students who stood in unity. The Regime blocked popular social media application such as WhatsApp, Instagram, Twitter, YouTube etc to stop spreading the word to the world. There is no free media in Iran and all official ones such as all available air tv and newspapers has been running by Islamic regime. There is a huge censorship in Iran regarding the protests and all the current situations. Hence, people use their own mobile camera and record videos from protests and mass murdering of people by regime in the street. The barbaric regime shoot directly to people who are in the street no matter they are protesting or recording videos or honking their car horn as an protesting act. There are several videos available that shows people have been murdered by shotgun while they were filming in peace. Just to mention a few names: Ghazaleh Chalavi and Shirin Alizadeh.

Their death were particularly shocking because of footage of the protests that they were making on their phone at the time they were conserved and uploaded on social media. - Impose travel bans against individuals affiliated with the IRI, the IRGC and the Iranian regime.
- Expel the IRI's ambassador from Australia, along with those who are closely connected with the IRI.
- Formally recognise the IRI as a terrorist nation, and the IRGC as a terrorist organisation.
- Put in place appropriate measures to avoid Australian taxpayers' money is not used to support the brutality of the IRI and its regime.
- To remove IRI from the UN Commission on the Status of Women

Urgency of this issue: Should Australia not be acting urgently on these issues, considering the death toll and the rate of arbitrary detention, and therefore the risk of abuse, violation, torture and death, are constantly rising since 16 September.
