Intergenerational welfare dependence

Inequality, disadvantage and welfare dependence are big issues.

The Select Committee on Intergenerational Welfare Dependence is holding a public hearing tomorrow at Parliament House as part of its inquiry into intergenerational welfare dependence. The inquiry is examining:

- factors leading to intergenerational welfare dependence
- the impact of intergenerational welfare dependence on children
- measures that can be taken to assist parents and children together to break the cycle of disadvantage.

Chair of the Committee, Russell Broadbent MP, said "the Committee is keen to examine the current design of Commonwealth programs to understand their impact on relieving intergenerational welfare dependence".

Deputy Chair, Ged Kearney MP, agreed, saying, "it's also important to evaluate the evidence base of interventions which might prove effective in combatting intergenerational disadvantage".
