

Senators,

Regarding the inquiry into the collection and disbursement of the compulsory \$5/head Transaction Levy.

Having received numerous submissions to the above inquiry, and after the meeting in Canberra on March 7<sup>th</sup>, you will know, without any doubt, that the current system completely disenfranchises the vast majority of the producers of grass fed cattle.

Following is a proposal for a completely new structure.

- 1) A new Board to be elected, by postal ballot, by levy paying producers of grass fed cattle.
- 2) The new board will replace the Cattle Council of Australia.
- 3) MLA will continue as a Service Provider without any funds from the \$5/head grass fed Transaction Levy.
- 4) The new Board will use MLA as a Service Provider as it sees fit.
- 5) A two tiered voting system to be used.
  - a) One vote per PIC
  - b) One vote per transaction levy paid – on a sliding scale similar to that used by MLA at present.  
A candidate for a seat on the Board or a proposal put to levy payers would have to attract over 50% of the vote in each register to be accepted.
- 6) By paying the \$5/head transaction levy on grass fed cattle, a producer automatically becomes a member of the new organization run by the newly elected Board and automatically receives voting entitlement and papers in the mail.
- 7) One Board member to be elected from each State except where there are more than 3 million cattle in a State, when there will be one board member per every 3 million cattle. e.g. Vic – 1, Tas – 1, SA – 1, NT – 1, WA – 1, NSW – 2, QLD – 4.
- 8) The new Board to receive the total amount collected by DAFF from the Transaction Levy on grass fed cattle. If this requires a change to legislation, then so be it.

DAFF has the different amounts raised by the two different classes of cattle ( grass fed and grain fed) from the returns forwarded by stock agents and abattoirs with the levies they collect.

For your information: For the 2012/13 financial year DAFF received the \$5/head transaction levy from 11,775,000 grass fed cattle and 1,828,000 grain fed cattle. (source – DAFF)

- 9) There are to be no appointments to the new board or seats allocated to various organizations or individuals.

It has been suggested that a “skills based board” also be set up to work with the newly elected Board.

This would be unnecessary.
