Dear Gary

I understand you are presently Chairing Meetings around New South Wales in regard to last summer's bushfires.

Of course fires can't burn without fuel.

I am a member of the Far South Coast National Parks Advisory Committee; Tim Sheppard is the Regional Manager.

At one of the committees meetings late last year around September or October as it was evident the Country was in a Drought as it still is, I raised the matter of fuel reduction in National Parks and so on, because it was evident to me that there were many National Parks surrounding Forested areas in close vicinity to towns and villages in the State of New South Wales that were at substantial risk in the event of fire.

I asked what was being done to reduce the risk of fire?

I was told that due to inadequate or limited resources nothing more would be done to reduce the potential risk in the Far South Coast Region, even though it was clear there was substantial risk to life and property.
