House Economics Committee hearing with Reserve Bank Governor

The House of Representatives Economics Committee will hold its next public hearing with Reserve Bank Governor Ian Macfarlane and other representatives of the Reserve Bank at Sydney University in **Sydney** on **Friday 31 May, 2002**.

Following closely after today's interest rate rise and the May 14 Federal Budget, this hearing will prove timely and significant. It will be the first time the Reserve Bank has appeared before the Committee for 12 months (the November/December hearing was cancelled due to the 2001 federal election).

With the outlook for interest rates taking on a heightened focus, markets will be watching closely for indications from the Reserve on expectations for the economy over the rest of the year. The Reserve will also be questioned on progress in the area of regulating credit card fees.
