I strongly object to your view that Compulsory Voting should be abolished. In my view, it is the very reason why Australia has such a strong democracy. Laws compel Australians to do many things for the protection of themselves and others eg not murdering anyone, wearing seat belts. Compulsory voting also protects our rights and freedoms in that it makes it more difficult for unscrupulous politicians to use covert practices to discourage certain people from voting whilst facilitate voting by electors who favour their policies. Your motives are questionable.

As well, because they are compelled to vote, I believe that more people than would otherwise, do take note of political campaigns and attempt to make a valid decision as to where to direct their primary vote and preferences.
