As a Tasmanian with a very great interest in the politics at home at local, state and federal level, I took every effort to ensure I was able to participate in last year's federal election, despite having lived in London for over three years now. I was enrolled before I left, and checked before hand to ensure my enrollment was current. I am living abroad out of necessity due to a lack of opportunities within my sector back in Australia (museums and culture), and hope the invaluable experience I have gained overseas, can one day soon be transferred back to Australia when I have an opportunity to return. As such I very clearly still have a very close interest in the affairs of Australian politics. I am quite sure many of the Australians who have been unable to participate due to disenfranchisement have similar feelings, and are probably quite disappointed not to be able to affect the outcome of their own constituency as they may wish, and as citizens is their democratic right to do.
