



How do Environmental Controls Impact on the Land

The House of Representatives Standing Committee on Environment and Heritage will hold a public hearing in Canberra at Parliament House this **Wednesday, 11 October**, to hear the views of the Australian Conservation Foundation regarding the impact of environmental measures imposed on private landholders. The Committee is interested in the costs to landholders of requirements to take conservation measures, such as protecting or rehabilitating native vegetation.

The House Environment Committee is currently holding a number of public hearings around Australia as part of its inquiry into this issue.
