Dear Sir,

In the best interests of children of separated parents I submit that it should not be presumed that all 'fathers' are the same and should be dealt with under one general rule.

some at a time when it
suited him - not on a
regular basis. Expects
to have them brought to
him and picked up
afterwards.

Many more points could be made re "quality" of time children experience with fathers.

Broadly - Father 1 keeps his language, self, and behaviour clean when with his children - and at other times, for that's the kind of man he is.

Father 2 is more irresponsible.

These are all facts - a few of many.

Please remember that overall hard and fast rules cannot be made for all fathers in matters of custody and access where the young are concerned. Great care should be taken to see that such rights are appropriately awarded.
