If joint custody was the > norm, a fairer property settlement would be arrived at. > Then realistic equal support to cover the upbringing of the children could > be arranged from both the mother and the father. ≥ > In many cases it is impossible for the father to be at work and to > look after the children at the same time. In these cases the custody > arrangements must be altered to suit the situation. > Equally the same applies in the mother's case if she is involved with a > career. > > Most importantly the children would have much more contact with both > the mother and father in joint custody.
