DOLLAR SITUATION—PROPOSED COMMONWEALTH CONFERENCE—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT.—Mr. Chiffey (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement informing the House that Australia would be represented at a conference of British Commonwealth Finance Ministers to be held in London in July to discuss matters connected with the shortage of dollars.
- 4. MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—ASSENT TO BILL.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was received, and was read by Mr. Deputy Speaker :—

# 5. JOINT COMMITTEE ON THE BROADCASTING OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS-FOURTH REPORT.-Mr. Deputy Speaker presented the Fourth Report from the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings. The Report is as follows:-

The Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings submits the Fourth Report for presentation to each House of the Parliament and recommends its adoption.

The Joint Committee has further considered the general principles upon which there should be determined the days upon which and the periods during which the proceedings of the Senate and the House of Representatives shall be broadcast, which were specified in the First, Second and Third Reports adopted by both Houses on 5th and 17th July, and 15th November, 1946, respectively. In accordance with section 12 (1.) of the Parliamentary Proceedings Broadcasting Act 

"(4.) Re-broadcast of questions and answers-

Within the limits of time available, the following Parliamentary proceedings shall be re-broadcast by the Australian Broadcasting Commission between 7.20 p.m. and 7.55 p.m. on each sitting day-

Senate proceedings-Questions without notice and on notice and answers thereto;

House of Representatives proceedings-Questions without notice and answers thereto."

The sub-paragraphs to be added are-

- "(b) When a member makes a personal explanation in rebuttal of misrepresentation contained in a question asked that day or an answer thereto, the question and answer shall, subject to the next succeeding sub-paragraph, be excluded from the re-broadcast.
  - (c) The Presiding Officer may, in his discretion, refer any case to the Joint Committee for decision as to whether such question and answer shall be excluded from the re-broadcast.".

- 7. CENSUS AND STATISTICS BILL 1949 .- Mr. Dedman (Minister for Defence) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Census and Statistics Act 1905-1946. Question—put and passed.

Mr. Dedman then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a first time.

Mr. Dedman moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time. Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 8. POSTFONEMENT OF ORDER OF THE DAY .-- Ordered -- That Order of the Day No. 1 be postponed until after Order of the Day No. 2, Government Business.
- 9. COMMONWEALTH CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION BILL 1949.-The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading-Mr. Evatt (Attorney-General) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed. Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

10. POST AND TELEGRAPH RATES BILL 1949 .- The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the Amendment moved thereto by Mr. Fadden, viz.:—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof :—"the Bill be referred to a Select Committee of this House appointed to inquire into and report upon the deterioration in the finances of the Postmaster-Debate resumed.

Ordered-That Mr. Calwell (Minister representing the Postmaster-General) be granted an extension of time.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.
