Question 1 - Respondents 214

- A significant help 64%
- A moderate help 21%
- No help at all 15%

Summary of Research conducted by Australian Institute of Export



Question 2 - Respondents 214
Yes 74%
No 23%



Export Market Development Grants Scheme

Its importance to exporters cont.

Issues:

- 1. All research concludes that the scheme is export effective and cost effective
- 2. For exporter confidence to be restored
 - The 2007/8 shortfall must be addressed
 - The 2010/11 cap must be set
 - Cap must Indexed to the CPI

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Key Exporter Issues

From an SME Exporter perspective

- Financing export activity remains a major hurdle
- Effective export skills development is challenging
- Research into exporter behaviour is too limited
- The disparate nature of trade facilitation reduces effectiveness
