Of the countries with which Australia has concluded Status of Forces Treaties, in which of those could the death penalty be applied to Australian military personnel?

Exchange of Notes constituting an Agreement between the	Entry into force:
Government of Australia and the Government of Malaysia on Five Power Defence Arrangements.	1 December 1971
Exchange of Notes constituting an Agreement between the Government of Australia and the Government of the Republic of Singapore on Five Power Defence Arrangements	Entry into force: 1 December 1971
Agreement between the Government of Australia and the Government of Malaysia concerning the Status of Forces	Entry into force: 22 July 1999

Each of the above three agreements contain provisions that an Australian Defence Force (ADF) member will not be subject to the territorial state's jurisdiction for acts done during the course of official duty. In those circumstances the death penalty would not apply. However, an ADF member could be subject to the territorial state's law (and hence the death penalty, where applicable) for acts or omissions done when that member is <u>not</u> on official duty. The agreements provide that Australia can ask the territorial state to waive jurisdiction, and that the territorial state shall give sympathetic consideration to such requests.

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
